1.3	requiring the commissioner to prepare a report to the governor.
1.4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.5	Section 1. LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE ON CHILD CARE.
1.6	Subdivision 1. Creation. A legislative task force on child care is created to review
1.7	the loss of child care providers in the state, assess affordability issues for providers and
1.8	parents, and identify areas that need to be addressed by the legislature.
1.9	Subd. 2. Membership. Task force members shall include:
1.10	(1) four members from the house of representatives appointed by the speaker, two
1.11	from the majority party and two from the minority party; and
1.12	(2) four members from the senate appointed by the majority leader, two from the
1.13	majority party and two from the minority party.
1.14	Subd. 3. Duties. (a) The task force may:
1.15	(1) evaluate factors that contribute to child care costs for providers and families;
1.16	(2) assess the child care provider shortage in greater Minnesota;
1.17	(3) review the current preservice and in-service training requirements for family
1.18	child care providers and child care center staff. This review shall include training required
1.19	for licensure, including staff credentialing for child care center staff positions and the ways
1.20	in which this training aligns with Minnesota's Career Lattice and Minnesota's Knowledge
1.21	and Competency Framework for Early Childhood and School-Aged Care Practitioners;
1.22	(4) review the availability of training that is in place to meet the training needs of
1.23	providers, including the content of this training, cost, and delivery methods;
