

1.1 A bill for an act
1.2 relating to capital investment; authorizing spending to acquire and better land and
1.3 buildings and for other improvements of a capital nature with certain conditions;
1.4 establishing and modifying programs; canceling prior appropriations; appropriating
1.5 money; amending Minnesota Statutes 2022, sections 116J.435, subdivisions 1, 7;
1.6 134.45, subdivision 5; 240A.20, subdivisions 1, 3, by adding subdivisions; Laws
1.7 2021, First Special Session chapter 14, article 11, section 42.

1.8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.9 **ARTICLE 1**
1.10 **APPROPRIATIONS**

1.11 Section 1. **CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT APPROPRIATIONS.**

1.12 (a) The sums shown in the column under "Appropriations" are appropriated from the
1.13 general fund in fiscal year 2024 to the state agencies or officials indicated, to be spent for
1.14 public purposes. These are onetime appropriations. Money appropriated in this act is available
1.15 until the project is completed or abandoned, subject to Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.642.

1.16 (b) For any project funded in whole or in part by this act, workers on the project must
1.17 be paid at least the prevailing wage rate as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 177.42,
1.18 subdivision 6, and the project is subject to the requirements and enforcement provisions in
1.19 Minnesota Statutes, sections 177.27, 177.30, 177.32, and 177.41 to 177.45. For the purposes
1.20 of this act, "project" means demolition, erection, construction, remodeling, or repairing of
1.21 a public building, facility, or other public work financed in whole or part by state funds.
1.22 Project also includes demolition, erection, construction, remodeling, or repairing of a
1.23 building, facility, or public work when the acquisition of property, predesign, design, or
1.24 demolition is financed in whole or in part by state funds.

2.1 (c) Money appropriated in this act: (1) is available for a grant after the commissioner of
2.2 management and budget determines that an amount sufficient to complete the project as
2.3 described in this act has been committed to the project, as required by Minnesota Statutes,
2.4 section 16A.502; and (2) may be used to pay state agency staff costs that are attributed
2.5 directly to the capital program or project for capitalizable staff costs.

2.6 (d) The sustainable building guidelines under Minnesota Statutes, section 16B.325, are
2.7 mandatory for all new buildings and major renovations owned or to be owned by the state,
2.8 state agencies, Minnesota State Colleges and Universities, and the University of Minnesota
2.9 that are funded with an appropriation in this act.

3.33 abatement of asbestos and hazardous
3.34 materials, construction, and renovations

4.1 required to improve safety and security for
4.2 occupants, meet ADA requirements, meet
4.3 energy saving requirements, and improve
4.4 indoor air quality standards. This appropriation
4.5 also includes money to predesign, design,

4.23 money under Minnesota Statutes, section

4.25 appropriation for capital expenditures allowed
4.26 under Minnesota Statutes, section 16B.307,
4.27 that do not constitute betterments and capital
4.28 improvements within the meaning of the
4.29 Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 5,
4.30 clause (a). The report required under

7.5 (a) For design, engineering, and construction
7.6 to repair, reconstruct, or remove publicly
7.7 owned dams and respond to dam safety
7.8 emergencies on publicly owned dams. The
7.9 commissioner shall determine project priorities
7.10 as appropriate under Minnesota Statutes,
7.11 sections 103G.511 and 103G.515.

7.12 (b) If the commissioner determines that a
7.13 project is not ready to proceed, this
7.14 appropriation may be used for other projects
7.15 on the commissioner's priority list.

7.16 **Subd. 8. Flood Hazard Mitigation** 25,300,000

7.17 (a) For the state share of flood hazard
7.18 mitigation grants for publicly owned capital
7.19 improvements to prevent or alleviate flood
7.20 damage under Minnesota Statutes, section
7.21 103F.161. To the extent practical, levee
7.22 projects shall meet the state standard of three
7.23 feet above the 100-year flood elevation.

7.24 (b) Project priorities shall be determined by
7.25 the commissioner as appropriate, based on
7.26 need and consideration of available leveraging
7.27 of federal, state, and local funds.

7.28 (c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b), \$3,300,000
7.29 is for phase II of the Toelle Coulee project in
7.30 Traverse County to mitigate flood risks posed
7.31 to the city of Browns Valley, including
7.32 construction of an East Levee, County
7.33 State-Aid Highway 2 culvert replacement, and

8.1 marked Trunk Highway 28 culvert
8.2 replacement.

8.3 (d) Notwithstanding paragraph (b), \$6,000,000
8.4 is for a grant to the city of Carver for capital
8.5 improvements to restore the Carver levee
8.6 protecting an important historic district in
8.7 Minnesota from flood waters of the Minnesota
8.8 River. This levee restoration must meet the
8.9 requirements for FEMA certification. The
8.10 project includes predesign, design,
8.11 engineering, land acquisition, and construction
8.12 of capital improvements, including raising the
8.13 height of the Carver levee, constructing
8.14 internal drainage, establishing maintainable
8.15 setbacks to adjacent structures, and
8.16 certification by FEMA.

8.17 (e) Notwithstanding paragraph (b),
8.18 \$11,000,000 is for a grant to the city of
8.19 Moorhead to design, construct, and equip
8.20 flood mitigation infrastructure. This
8.21 appropriation includes money for Phase 2 of
8.22 the North Moorhead levee project, the
8.23 relocation of sanitary lift station #2, and a
8.24 levee project along First Avenue North.

8.25 (f) To the extent practicable and consistent
8.26 with the project, recipients of appropriations
8.27 for flood control projects in this subdivision
8.28 shall create wetlands that are eligible for
8.29 wetland replacement credit to replace wetlands
8.30 drained or filled as the result of repair,
8.31 reconstruction, replacement, or rehabilitation
8.32 of an existing public road under Minnesota
8.33 Statutes, section 103G.222, subdivision 1,
8.34 paragraphs (l) and (m).

9.1 (g) To the extent that the cost of a municipal
9.2 project exceeds two percent of the median
9.3 household income in the municipality
9.4 multiplied by the number of households in the
9.5 municipality, this appropriation is also for the
9.6 local share of the project.

9.7 **Subd. 9. Canisteo Legacy Mine Pit Complex**

9.8 (a) For the acquisition of land or interests in
9.9 land and for construction of publicly owned
9.10 infrastructure to mitigate the imminent threat
9.11 to public safety, property, and regional water
9.12 quality from the rising water at the Canisteo
9.13 legacy mine pit complex.

9.14 (b) Upon substantial completion of the project
9.15 authorized in this subdivision and after written
9.16 notice to the commissioner of management
9.17 and budget, the commissioner of natural
9.18 resources may use any money remaining in
9.19 this appropriation to design, engineer, and
9.20 construct publicly owned water mitigation
9.21 infrastructure at the Hill annex open pit mining
9.22 complex.

9.23 (c) Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes,
9.24 sections 92.50 and 282.04, or other law to the
9.25 contrary, the commissioner and the county
9.26 may enter into leases for this project for a term
9.27 that is consistent with meeting project needs.

9.28 A lease entered into under this subdivision
9.29 must include a provision that provides for the
9.30 amendment or termination of the lease when
9.31 (1) the commissioner of natural resources
9.32 determines that the project is no longer needed
9.33 to serve the intended purpose or identifies a
9.34 more effective alternative to the constructed
