1.11	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 169A.63, subdivision 1, is amended to read:
1.12	Subdivision 1. Definitions. (a) As used in this section, the following terms have the
1.13	meanings given them.
1.14	(b) "Appropriate agency" means a law enforcement agency that has the authority to
1.15	make an arrest for a violation of a designated offense or to require a test under section
1.16	169A.51 (chemical tests for intoxication).
1.17	(c) "Asserting person" means a person, other than the driver alleged to have committed
1.18	a designated offense, claiming an ownership interest in a vehicle that has been seized or
1.19	restrained under this section.
1.20	(c) (d) "Claimant" means an owner of a motor vehicle or a person claiming a leasehold
1.21	or security interest in a motor vehicle.
1.22	(d) (e) "Designated license revocation" includes a license revocation under section
1.23	169A.52 (license revocation for test failure or refusal) or 171.177 (revocation; search warrant)
1.24	or a license disqualification under section 171.165 (commercial driver's license

- disqualification) resulting from a violation of section 169A.52 or 171.177; within ten years
 of the first of two or more qualified prior impaired driving incidents.
- 2.3 (e) (f) "Designated offense" includes:
- 2.4 (1) a violation of section 169A.20 (driving while impaired) under the circumstances
- 2.5 described in section 169A.24 (first-degree driving while impaired), or 169A.25
- 2.6 (second-degree driving while impaired); or
- 2.7 (2) a violation of section 169A.20 or an ordinance in conformity with it: within ten years

2.8 of the first of two qualified prior impaired driving incidents.

- 2.9 (i) by a person whose driver's license or driving privileges have been canceled as inimical
 2.10 to public safety under section 171.04, subdivision 1, clause (10), and not reinstated; or
- 2.11 (ii) by a person who is subject to a restriction on the person's driver's license under
- 2.12 section 171.09 (commissioner's license restrictions), which provides that the person may

2.13 not use or consume any amount of alcohol or a controlled substance.

- 2.14 (f) (g) "Family or household member" means:
- 2.15 (1) a parent, stepparent, or guardian;

2.16 (2) any of the following persons related by blood, marriage, or adoption: brother, sister,

2.17 stepbrother, stepsister, first cousin, aunt, uncle, nephew, niece, grandparent,

- 2.18 great-grandparent, great-uncle, great-aunt; or
- 2.19 (3) persons residing together or persons who regularly associate and communicate with2.20 one another outside of a workplace setting.
- 2.21 (g) (h) "Motor vehicle" and "vehicle" do not include a vehicle which is stolen or taken
 2.22 in violation of the law.

(h) (i) "Owner" means a person legally entitled to possession, use, and control of a motor
vehicle, including a lessee of a motor vehicle if the lease agreement has a term of 180 days
or more. There is a rebuttable presumption that a person registered as the owner of a motor
vehicle according to the records of the Department of Public Safety is the legal owner. For
purposes of this section, if a motor vehicle is owned jointly by two or more people, each
owner's interest extends to the whole of the vehicle and is not subject to apportionment.

2.29 (i) (j) "Prosecuting authority" means the attorney in the jurisdiction in which the
2.30 designated offense occurred who is responsible for prosecuting violations of a designated
2.31 offense or a designee. If a state agency initiated the forfeiture, and the attorney responsible

- for prosecuting the designated offense declines to pursue forfeiture, the Attorney General's
 Office or its designee may initiate forfeiture under this section.
- 3.3 (j) (k) "Security interest" means a bona fide security interest perfected according to
- 3.4 section 168A.17, subdivision 2, based on a loan or other financing that, if a vehicle is
- 3.5 required to be registered under chapter 168, is listed on the vehicle's title.

3.6 EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective January 1, 2022, and applies to seizures 3.7 that take place on or after that date.

3.9 Subd. 7. Limitations on vehicle forfeiture. (a) A vehicle is presumed subject to forfeiture
3.10 under this section if:

- 3.11 (1) the driver is convicted of the designated offense upon which the forfeiture is based;
 3.12 or
- 3.13 (2) the driver fails to appear for a scheduled court appearance with respect to the
 3.14 designated offense charged and fails to voluntarily surrender within 48 hours after the time
 3.15 required for appearance; or
- 3.16 (3)(2) the driver's conduct results in a designated license revocation and the driver fails
 3.17 to seek judicial review of the revocation in a timely manner as required by section 169A.53,
 3.18 subdivision 2, (petition for judicial review), or the license revocation is judicially reviewed
 3.19 and sustained under section 169A.53, subdivision 2.
- (b) A vehicle encumbered by a security interest perfected according to section 168A.17, 3.20 subdivision 2, or subject to a lease that has a term of 180 days or more, is subject to the 3.21 interest of the secured party or lessor unless the party or lessor had knowledge of or consented 3.22 to the act upon which the forfeiture is based. However, when the proceeds of the sale of a 3.23 seized vehicle do not equal or exceed the outstanding loan balance, the appropriate agency 3.24 shall remit all proceeds of the sale to the secured party after deducting the agency's costs 3.25 for the seizure, tow, storage, forfeiture, and sale of the vehicle. If the sale of the vehicle is 3.26 conducted in a commercially reasonable manner consistent with the provisions of section 3.27 336.9-610, the agency is not liable to the secured party for any amount owed on the loan in 3.28 excess of the sale proceeds. The validity and amount of a nonperfected security interest 3.29 must be established by its holder by clear and convincing evidence. 3.30
- 3.31 (c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b), the secured party's or lessor's interest in a vehicle is
 3.32 not subject to forfeiture based solely on the secured party's or lessor's knowledge of the act
 3.33 or omission upon which the forfeiture is based if the secured party or lessor demonstrates

- by clear and convincing evidence that the party or lessor took reasonable steps to terminate 4.1 use of the vehicle by the offender. 4.2
- (d) A motor vehicle is not subject to forfeiture under this section if any of its owners 4.3 who petition the court can demonstrate by clear and convincing evidence that the petitioning 4.4 owner did not have actual or constructive knowledge that the vehicle would be used or 4.5 operated in any manner contrary to law or that the petitioning owner took reasonable steps 4.6 to prevent use of the vehicle by the offender. If the offender is a family or household member
- of any of the owners who petition the court and has three or more prior impaired driving 4.8
- convictions, the petitioning owner is presumed to know of any vehicle use by the offender 4.9
- that is contrary to law. "Vehicle use contrary to law" includes, but is not limited to, violations 4.10

- Subd. 7a. Innocent owner. (a) An asserting person may bring an innocent owner claim 4.22 by notifying the prosecuting authority in writing and within 60 days of the service of the 4.23
- notice of seizure. 4.24
- (b) Upon receipt of notice pursuant to paragraph (a), the prosecuting authority may 4.25 release the vehicle to the asserting person. If the prosecuting authority proceeds with the 4.26 forfeiture, the prosecuting authority must, within 30 days, file a separate complaint in the 4.27 name of the jurisdiction pursuing the forfeiture against the vehicle, describing the vehicle, 4.28
- specifying that the vehicle was used in the commission of a designated offense or was used 4.29
- in conduct resulting in a designated license revocation, and specifying the time and place 4.30

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5.1	(c) A complaint filed by the prosecuting authority must be served on the asserting person
5.2	and on any other registered owners. Service may be made by certified mail at the address
5.3	listed in the Department of Public Safety's computerized motor vehicle registration records
5.4	or by any means permitted by court rules.
5.5	(d) The hearing on the complaint shall, to the extent practicable, be held within 30 days
5.6	of the filing of the petition. The court may consolidate the hearing on the complaint with a
5.7	hearing on any other complaint involving a claim of an ownership interest in the same
5.8	vehicle.
5.9	(e) At a hearing held pursuant to this subdivision, the prosecuting authority must:
5.10	(1) prove by a preponderance of the evidence that the seizure was incident to a lawful

5.23	(h) The court shall order that the vehicle is not subject to forfeiture under this section
5.24	and shall order the vehicle returned to the asserting person if it determines that:

6.7 Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 169A.63, subdivision 8, is amended to read:

6.8 Subd. 8. Administrative forfeiture procedure. (a) A motor vehicle used to commit a
6.9 designated offense or used in conduct resulting in a designated license revocation is subject
6.10 to administrative forfeiture under this subdivision.

(b) Within 60 days from when a motor vehicle is seized under subdivision 2, or within 6.11 a reasonable time after seizure, the appropriate agency shall serve the driver or operator of 6.12 the vehicle with a notice of the seizure and intent to forfeit the vehicle. Additionally, when 6.13 a motor vehicle is seized under subdivision 2, or within a reasonable time after that, all 6.14 persons known to have an ownership, possessory, or security interest in the vehicle must 6.15 be notified of the seizure and the intent to forfeit the vehicle. For those vehicles required to 6.16 be registered under chapter 168, the notification to a person known to have a security interest 6.17 in the vehicle is required only if the vehicle is registered under chapter 168 and the interest 6.18 is listed on the vehicle's title. Upon motion by the appropriate agency or prosecuting 6.19 authority, a court may extend the time period for sending notice for a period not to exceed 6.20 90 days for good cause shown. Notice mailed by certified mail to the address shown in 6.21 Department of Public Safety records is sufficient notice to the registered owner of the 6.22 vehicle. For motor vehicles not required to be registered under chapter 168, notice mailed 6.23 by certified mail to the address shown in the applicable filing or registration for the vehicle 6.24 is sufficient notice to a person known to have an ownership, possessory, or security interest 6.25 in the vehicle. Otherwise, notice may be given in the manner provided by law for service 6.26 of a summons in a civil action. 6.27

6.28

(c) The notice must be in writing and contain:

6.29 (1) a description of the vehicle seized;

6.30 (2) the date of seizure; and

(3) notice of the right to obtain judicial review of the forfeiture and of the procedure for
obtaining that judicial review, printed in English. This requirement does not preclude the
appropriate agency from printing the notice in other languages in addition to English.

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Substantially the following language must appear conspicuously in the notice: "WARNING: <u>If you were the driver</u>, you will automatically lose the above-described property and the right to be heard in court if you do not file a lawsuit and serve the prosecuting authority within 60 days. You may file your lawsuit in conciliation court if the property is worth \$15,000 or less; otherwise, you must file in district court. You <u>may do</u> not have to pay a filing fee for your lawsuit if you are unable to afford the fee. You do not have to pay a conciliation court fee if your property is worth less than \$500.

7.8 WARNING: If you have an ownership interest in the vehicle and were not the driver,
7.9 you will automatically lose the above-described property and the right to be heard in court
7.10 if you do not notify the prosecuting authority of your interest in writing within 60 days."

(d) If notice is not sent in accordance with paragraph (b), and no time extension is granted
or the extension period has expired, the appropriate agency shall return the property vehicle
to the person from whom the property was seized, if known owner. An agency's return of
property due to lack of proper notice does not restrict the agency's authority to commence
a forfeiture proceeding at a later time. The agency shall not be required to return contraband
or other property that the person from whom the property was seized may not legally possess.

(e) Within 60 days following service of a notice of seizure and forfeiture under this 7.17 subdivision, a claimant may file a demand for a judicial determination of the forfeiture. The 7.18 demand must be in the form of a civil complaint and must be filed with the court 7.19 administrator in the county in which the seizure occurred, together with proof of service of 7.20 a copy of the complaint on the prosecuting authority having jurisdiction over the forfeiture, 7.21 including the standard filing fee for civil actions unless the petitioner has the right to sue 7.22 in forma pauperis under section 563.01. The claimant may serve the complaint by certified 7.23 mail or any means permitted by court rules. If the value of the seized property is \$15,000 7.24 or less, the claimant may file an action in conciliation court for recovery of the seized vehicle. 7.25 7.26 A copy of the conciliation court statement of claim must be served personally or by mail on the prosecuting authority having jurisdiction over the forfeiture, as well as on the 7.27 appropriate agency that initiated the forfeiture, within 60 days following service of the 7.28 notice of seizure and forfeiture under this subdivision. If the value of the seized property is 7.29 less than \$500, The claimant does not have to pay the conciliation court filing fee. 7.30

No responsive pleading is required of the prosecuting authority and no court fees may
be charged for the prosecuting authority's appearance in the matter. The prosecuting authority
may appear for the appropriate agency. Pleadings, filings, and methods of service are
governed by the Rules of Civil Procedure.

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(f) The complaint must be captioned in the name of the claimant as plaintiff and the
seized vehicle as defendant, and must state with specificity the grounds on which the claimant
alleges the vehicle was improperly seized, the claimant's interest in the vehicle seized, and
any affirmative defenses the claimant may have. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary,
an action for the return of a vehicle seized under this section may not be maintained by or
on behalf of any person who has been served with a notice of seizure and forfeiture unless
the person has complied with this subdivision.

8.8 (g) If the claimant makes a timely demand for a judicial determination under this
8.9 subdivision, the forfeiture proceedings must be conducted as provided under subdivision
8.10 9.

8.11 EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective January 1, 2022, and applies to seizures 8.12 that take place on or after that date.

8.13 Sec. 5. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 169A.63, subdivision 9, is amended to read:

8.14 Subd. 9. Judicial forfeiture procedure. (a) This subdivision governs judicial
8.15 determinations of the forfeiture of a motor vehicle used to commit a designated offense or
8.16 used in conduct resulting in a designated license revocation. An action for forfeiture is a
8.17 civil in rem action and is independent of any criminal prosecution. All proceedings are
8.18 governed by the Rules of Civil Procedure.

(b) If no demand for judicial determination of the forfeiture is pending, the prosecuting
authority may, in the name of the jurisdiction pursuing the forfeiture, file a separate complaint
against the vehicle, describing it, specifying that it was used in the commission of a
designated offense or was used in conduct resulting in a designated license revocation, and
specifying the time and place of its unlawful use.

(c) The prosecuting authority may file an answer to a properly served demand for judicial
determination, including an affirmative counterclaim for forfeiture. The prosecuting authority
is not required to file an answer.

(d) A judicial determination under this subdivision must be held at the earliest practicable
date, and in any event no later than 180 days following the filing of the demand by the
claimant. If a related criminal proceeding is pending, the hearing shall not be held until the
conclusion of the criminal proceedings. The district court administrator shall schedule the
hearing as soon as practicable after the conclusion of the criminal prosecution. The district
court administrator shall establish procedures to ensure efficient compliance with this
subdivision. The hearing is to the court without a jury.

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9.1 (e) There is a presumption that a vehicle seized under this section is subject to forfeiture
9.2 if the prosecuting authority establishes that the vehicle was used in the commission of a
9.3 designated offense or designated license revocation. A claimant bears the burden of proving
9.4 any affirmative defense raised.

9.5 (f) If the forfeiture is based on the commission of a designated offense and the person charged with the designated offense appears in court as required and is not convicted of the 9.6 offense, the court shall order the property returned to the person legally entitled to it upon 9.7 that person's compliance with the redemption requirements of section 169A.42. If the 9.8 forfeiture is based on a designated license revocation, and the license revocation is rescinded 9.9 under section 169A.53, subdivision 3 (judicial review hearing, issues, order, appeal), the 9.10 court shall order the property returned to the person legally entitled to it upon that person's 9.11 compliance with the redemption requirements of section 169A.42. 9.12

9.13 (g) If the lawful ownership of the vehicle used in the commission of a designated offense
9.14 or used in conduct resulting in a designated license revocation can be determined and the
9.15 owner makes the demonstration required under subdivision 7, paragraph (d) 7a, the vehicle
9.16 must be returned immediately upon the owner's compliance with the redemption requirements
9.17 of section 169A.42.

9.18 (h) If the court orders the return of a seized vehicle under this subdivision it must order
9.19 that filing fees be reimbursed to the person who filed the demand for judicial determination.
9.20 In addition, the court may order sanctions under section 549.211 (sanctions in civil actions).
9.21 Any reimbursement fees or sanctions must be paid from other forfeiture proceeds of the
9.22 law enforcement agency and prosecuting authority involved and in the same proportion as
9.23 distributed under subdivision 10, paragraph (b).

9.27 Subd. 10. Disposition of forfeited vehicle. (a) If the vehicle is administratively forfeited
9.28 under subdivision 8, or if the court finds under subdivision 9 that the vehicle is subject to
9.29 forfeiture under subdivisions 6 and 7, the appropriate agency shall:

9.30 (1) sell the vehicle and distribute the proceeds under paragraph (b); or

9.31 (2) keep the vehicle for official use. If the agency keeps a forfeited motor vehicle for
9.32 official use, it shall make reasonable efforts to ensure that the motor vehicle is available for
9.33 use by the agency's officers who participate in the drug abuse resistance education program.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of forfeited vehicles, after payment of seizure, towing,
storage, forfeiture, and sale expenses, and satisfaction of valid liens against the property,
must be distributed as follows:

(1) 70 percent of the proceeds must be forwarded to the appropriate agency for deposit

(2) 30 percent of the money or proceeds must be forwarded to the prosecuting authority
that handled the forfeiture for deposit as a supplement to its operating fund or similar fund
for prosecutorial purposes, training, education, crime prevention, equipment, or capital
expenses. For purposes of this subdivision, the prosecuting authority shall not include
privately contracted prosecutors of a local political subdivision and, in those events, the
forfeiture proceeds shall be forwarded to the political subdivision where the forfeiture was
handled for the purposes identified in clause (1).

(c) If a vehicle is sold under paragraph (a), the appropriate agency shall not sell the
vehicle to: (1) an officer or employee of the agency that seized the property or to a person
related to the officer or employee by blood or marriage; or (2) the prosecuting authority or
any individual working in the same office or a person related to the authority or individual
by blood or marriage.

10.20 (d) Sales of forfeited vehicles under this section must be conducted in a commercially10.21 reasonable manner.

(e) If a vehicle is forfeited administratively under this section and no demand for judicial 10.22 determination is made, the appropriate agency shall provide the prosecuting authority with 10.23 a copy of the forfeiture or evidence receipt, the notice of seizure and intent to forfeit, a 10.24 statement of probable cause for forfeiture of the property, and a description of the property 10.25 and its estimated value. APPENDIX Repealed Minnesota Statutes: H0075-1

609.5317 REAL PROPERTY; SEIZURES.

Subdivision 1. **Rental property.** (a) When contraband or a controlled substance manufactured, distributed, or acquired in violation of chapter 152 is seized on residential rental property incident to a lawful search or arrest, the prosecuting authority shall give the notice required by this subdivision to (1) the landlord of the property or the fee owner identified in the records of the county assessor, and (2) the agent authorized by the owner to accept service pursuant to section 504B.181. The notice is not required during an ongoing investigation. The notice shall state what has been seized and specify the applicable duties and penalties under this subdivision. The notice shall state that the landlord who chooses to assign the right to bring an eviction action retains all rights and duties, including removal of a tenant's personal property following issuance of the writ of recovery and delivery of the writ to the sheriff for execution. The notice shall also state that the landlord may contact the prosecuting authority if threatened by the tenant. Notice shall be sent by certified letter, return receipt requested, within 30 days of the seizure. If receipt is not returned, notice shall be given in the manner provided by law for service of summons in a civil action.

(b) Within 15 days after notice of the first occurrence, the landlord shall bring, or assign to the prosecuting authority of the county in which the real property is located, the right to bring an eviction action against the tenant. The assignment must be in writing on a form prepared by the prosecuting authority. Should the landlord choose to assign the right to bring an eviction action, the assignment shall be limited to those rights and duties up to and including delivery of the writ of recovery to the sheriff for execution.

(c) Upon notice of a second occurrence on any residential rental property owned by the same landlord in the same county and involving the same tenant, and within one year after notice of the first occurrence, the property is subject to forfeiture under sections 609.531, 609.5311, 609.5313, and 609.5315, unless an eviction action has been commenced as provided in paragraph (b) or the right to bring an eviction action was assigned to the prosecuting authority as provided in paragraph (b). If the right has been assigned and not previously exercised, or if the prosecuting authority requests an assignment and the landlord makes an assignment, the prosecuting authority may bring an eviction action rather than an action for forfeiture.

(d) The Department of Corrections Fugitive Apprehension Unit shall not seize real property for the purposes of forfeiture as described in paragraphs (a) to (c).

Subd. 2. Additional remedies. Nothing in subdivision 1 prevents the prosecuting authority from proceeding under section 609.5311 whenever that section applies.

Subd. 3. **Defenses.** It is a defense against a proceeding under subdivision 1, paragraph (b), that the tenant had no knowledge or reason to know of the presence of the contraband or controlled substance or could not prevent its being brought onto the property.

It is a defense against a proceeding under subdivision 1, paragraph (c), that the landlord made every reasonable attempt to evict a tenant or to assign the prosecuting authority the right to bring an eviction against the tenant, or that the landlord did not receive notice of the seizure.

Subd. 4. **Limitations.** This section shall not apply if the retail value of the controlled substance is less than \$100, but this section does not subject real property to forfeiture under section 609.5311 unless the retail value of the controlled substance is: (1) \$1,000 or more; or (2) there have been two previous controlled substance seizures involving the same tenant.
