It shall be the duty of the county to which a judge is temporarily assigned to serve and discharge the duties of the probate judge, to make payment to such judge in the amount and in the manner prescribed by the chief judge.*

*An act relating to the administration of state government; appropriating moneys therefor and limiting the use thereof; providing for the transfer of certain moneys in the state treasury; adjusting the salaries of certain state officers and employees; limiting the amount of fees to be collected for deposit in the state treasury; and providing penalties for misusing funds appropriated hereby.*

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. EXPENSES OF STATE GOVERNMENT APPROPRIATIONS. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, the sums hereinafter set forth in the columns designated "APPROPRIATIONS," or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby appropriated out of the general revenue fund in the state treasury, or any other fund herein designated, for the purposes specified in the following sections of this act, to be available for the fiscal years indicated for each purpose. The figure "1959", "1960" and "1961" wherever used in this act, shall mean that the appropriation or appropriations listed thereunder shall be available for the year ending June 30, 1959, June 30, 1960, and June 30, 1961, respectively.

Notwithstanding any provision in Laws 1957, Chapter 412, to the contrary, whenever the state reformatory for men shall certify to the commissioner of administration that expenses have been incurred for material, labor and any additional equipment which may have been purchased for the manufacture of number plates, the commissioner of administration may, even though a number plate order has not been completed, approve the certification and direct the auditor and treasurer to pay such expenses or to reimburse the state reformatory for men therefor from the moneys appropriated hereby. If the division of purchases incurs expenses for material or for any additional equipment which may have been purchased for the manufacture of number plates, the commissioner of administration may in a like manner direct the auditor and treasurer to pay such expenses.

The moneys appropriated by Subd. 7, items (a), (b), (c) are hereby appropriated from the highway user tax distribution fund. None of such appropriations are chargeable against the revenue fund.

The license plates revolving fund created by Laws 1957, Chapter 412, is hereby abolished.

For the purpose of computing payment of overtime, employees of the Grain Inspection Division shall be compensated for each week's work on the following basis: For time worked up to 40 hours, regular salary; for time worked in excess of 40 hours in any one week, one and one-half times his regular salary, provided, however, that no employee shall receive overtime for any one day except for time worked in excess of 10 hours in that day, or until he has worked 40 hours in that week, except that such employee shall receive one and one-half times his regular salary for time worked on Sundays and regular holidays, irrespective of the number of hours worked during any one day, or during said week. The Commission is directed to adjust its schedule of fees before the end of each fiscal year to provide that the initial charge made for services to be rendered during the next fiscal year shall be sufficient to provide an income during the latter fiscal year equal to the amount of the appropriation for that year for salaries, overtime, expenses, which shall include, without limitation, an amount for state retirement and social security contributions. If the income from the fees provided for herein during any fiscal year shall be more than 105 percent of such appropriation for that year, the Commission, in adjusting its schedule of fees for use in the next fiscal year, shall fix the fees to produce income in the amount of such appropriation less the amount of such excess over 105 percent of the appropriation first referred to herein. If the income from the fees provided for herein during any fiscal year shall be less than the appropriation for that year, the Commission, in adjusting its schedule of fees for use in the next fiscal year, shall fix the

fees to produce income in the amount of the appropriation for the latter year plus the amount of the difference between the appropriation for the year first referred to herein and the total income from such fees during that year. Such schedule of fees shall provide that any elevator, mill or other commission business requesting the service of a weigher, shall pay a minimum charge of \$1.75 per hour for each weigher requested or assigned. Any fees earned by such weigher shall be credited against the charge made therefor. Such minimum charge shall be assessed only after taking into consideration all fees earned and all hours charged. Excess fees earned over hours charged shall be carried forward from month to month during any one fiscal year. When deemed necessary by the Chief of Grain Inspection, a charge for actual overtime costs may be made.

ligated balances on hand as of June 30, 1959, June 30, 1960, and June 30, 1961 in the several appropriations and accounts for each of the state departments or divisions for which an appropriation is made herein out of the general revenue fund, are hereby cancelled into said general revenue fund as of June 30, 1959, June 30, 1960, and June 30, 1961, and the unobligated balances on hand as of June 30, 1959, June 30, 1960, and June 30, 1961 appropriated out of any other funds, shall be cancelled into the fund from which they are appropriated as of June 30, 1959, June 30, 1960, and June 30, 1961. The provisions of this section shall not apply to aid contributions, or reimbursements, received from the federal government by the state; and all such federal aid, contributions or reimbursements are hereby reappropriated for the purpose of supplementing the appropriations herein provided.

Sec. 54. **INCOME PLACED IN GENERAL REVENUE FUND.** Except as herein otherwise provided, all income, including fees or receipts of any nature whatsoever, except all federal aid, contributions or reimbursements received for any account of any division or department for which an appropriation is made in this act, shall be deposited in and for the benefit of the general revenue fund.

Sec. 55. **STATE INHERITANCE TAX, SHARE OF COUNTY.** The State Auditor and State Treasurer are hereby authorized to set aside in a separate account the amount due the several counties as their share of the state inheritance tax under the provisions of General Laws 1911, Chapter 209, Section 21-D, and acts amendatory thereof, and to pay to the county treasurer of the several counties such amounts at the end of each fiscal year.

Sec. 56. **MISAPPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.** It shall be illegal for any state officer or head of any state department or any employee thereof to use moneys appropriated by this act, or fees collected, for any other purpose than the purpose for which such moneys have been appropriated and any such act by any such person shall be cause for immediate removal from the office or position he holds with the government of the state. Provided, however, that funds may be transferred to the credit of the State Employees' Retirement Fund and used for the purposes thereof, as provided by law.

Sec. 57. **PUBLICITY REPRESENTATIVES.** No state department, bureau or division, whether the same operates on funds appropriated or receipts or fees of any nature whatsoever, except the Highway Department, the Game and Fish Division and the Division of Employment Security shall

use any of such funds for the payment of the salary or expenses of a publicity representative. The head of any such department, bureau or division shall be personally liable for funds used contrary to this provision. This act shall not be construed, however, as preventing any such department, bureau or division from sending out any bulletins or other publicity required by any state law or necessary for the satisfactory conduct of the business for which such department, bureau or division was created.

**Sec. 58. REAPPROPRIATION OF CERTAIN MON- EYS.** The unexpended balances of certain appropriations made to the governor or the commissioner of aeronautics by any of the laws hereinafter set forth or any amendment thereof are hereby reappropriated to the governor or the commissioner of aeronautics respectively, for the biennium ending June 30, 1961 for the purposes of such laws. Any and all provisions of any of the laws hereinafter set forth which must be in effect to provide for the appropriation hereinabove made are hereby extended or reenacted as may be necessary for such purpose. The total amount of the appropriations made by the laws hereinafter referred to shall not exceed the amount originally appropriated. The laws hereinabove referred to are the following: Laws 1951, Chapter 506; Laws 1953, Chapter 636; Laws 1955, Chapter 719, and Laws 1957, Chapter 931.

**Subd. 1.** Whenever it becomes necessary in order to meet the current demands upon the revenue fund for the payment of warrants issued or to be issued against said fund pursuant to appropriations, the governor after securing the recommendation of the legislative advisory committee, which shall be advisory only, or, if there be no such committee, the governor, the state auditor, and the state treasurer, as a special committee, at any time prior to June 30, 1961, may authorize the issuance and sale of certificates of indebtedness of the state, payable out of said revenue fund, in such amount as may be necessary to pay such warrants; such certificates to be signed by the state treasurer, attested and recorded by the state auditor, and to be numbered serially and to be of such denomination and bear such dates of issue and of maturity and such rate of interest as the governor or such special committee shall determine; provided, that

no such certificate shall mature after the current fiscal year, and provided further, that the aggregate amount of such certificate at any time outstanding shall never exceed \$3,000,000. The failure or refusal of the advisory committee, if there be one, to make a recommendation promptly shall be deemed a negative recommendation. If such funds are not available to retire any such certificate at maturity, the same may be refunded by the issuance of new certificates or may be extended by agreement with the holders thereof. Certificates issued and sold pursuant to the authorization of this act shall be retired out of the receipts of the revenue fund appropriated to the payment of the warrants issued against said fund but taken up with the proceeds of such certificates.

a. Interest upon certificates \$ 50,000

- Subd. 2. The state board of investment, or its successor in authority, is hereby authorized to purchase the certificates of indebtedness herein authorized for any fund which it is authorized to invest, provided, it shall not purchase any such certificates bearing interest at a rate of less than one and one-half percent per annum.

Sec. 60. TRANSFER OF FUNDS, STATE AUDITOR. The state auditor is hereby authorized and directed to transfer to the general revenue fund in the state treasury, all moneys credited to any fund established in connection with the payment of certificates of indebtedness when the purposes for which the act authorizing such certificates have been accomplished.

- Subd. 1. There is hereby transferred to the general revenue fund the following sums to reimburse the general revenue fund for amounts transferred out of the general contingent fund for the following purposes, for the following years:

Subd. 2. There is hereby transferred to the general revenue fund the sum of \$531,787.25 to reimburse the general revenue fund for the cost of collecting the tax on gasoline and gasoline substitutes and the cost of bond premiums during the 1957-59 biennium, from the Highway User Tax Distribution Fund.

There is hereby transferred from the general revenue fund the sum of \$2,639.49 to correct an overestimate in the cost of collecting the tax on gasoline and gasoline substitutes during the 1955-57 biennium, the sum to be transferred to the Highway User Tax Distribution Fund. The provisions of Subd. 2 shall take effect upon passage of this act.

There is hereby transferred to the general revenue fund the sum of \$31,396.21 to reimburse the general revenue fund for functions performed by the office of the State Treasurer in mailing gas tax refunds during the 1957-59 biennium, from the Highway User Tax Distribution Fund.

Sec. 61. **RETROACTIVE MERIT INCREASES.** The moneys appropriated by this act from which salaries may be paid for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1959 may be expended

retroactively for merit increases to state employees entitled thereto from and after July 1, 1958.

Sec. 62. MERIT INCREASES. Notwithstanding any provision of M. S. 1957, Chapter 43, as amended, to the contrary, the moneys provided by this act or any other appropriation law may be expended for merit increases only in accordance with the following: Only one merit increase for each position below the maximum of its range may be granted during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1960, and one merit increase may be granted during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961, but no such merit increases shall be granted prior to January 1 in each of such fiscal years.

When a position at the maximum is vacated an additional amount equal to one merit increase for six months is available therefor to be expended only at the times prescribed in the previous paragraph.

Merit increases granted pursuant to this section shall be on the basis of established standards, but in no event to exceed one merit increase per eligible employee per fiscal year.

None of the moneys appropriated by this act or by any other law shall be expended during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1960, for economic salary adjustments notwithstanding the provisions of law relating thereto to the contrary.

In addition to any other moneys appropriated in this act, the sums hereinafter stated are hereby appropriated from the listed accounts and funds in the state treasury for the purpose of carrying out the provisions enumerated in the preceding paragraphs.

Sec. 63. APPROVED COMPLEMENTS. Whenever an appropriation to any state department or agency for salaries discloses an approved complement, that department or agency, except for seasonal and part time employees, is limited in the employment of the number of persons indicated by such approved complement. The employment of seasonal and part time employees shall be in addition to the approved complement but subject to the approval of the commissioner of administration who shall determine the need therefor.

Additional employees over the number of the approved

complement may be employed on the basis of public necessity or emergency with the written approval of the governor, but the governor shall not approve such additional personnel until he has consulted with the legislative advisory committee created by Laws 1941, Chapter 497, and such committee has made its recommendation upon the matter. Such recommendation shall be advisory only. Failure or refusal of the committee to make a recommendation promptly shall be deemed a negative recommendation. The provisions hereof shall extend to any other agency to which the present authority of the legislative advisory committee may be transferred, but shall be deemed to be repealed in case such authority shall be abolished.

#### Sec. 64. SURPLUS VACANT POSITIONS

Subd. 1. Except as provided in Subdivision 2 hereof, no moneys appropriated for salaries may be used to pay the salary of any position in the classified service of the State Civil Service which becomes a surplus vacant position under the following provisions hereof. Every state office and every head of a state department or agency or division of either created by law shall keep a record of every position in the classified service in his office, department or agency or division of either created by law which becomes vacant. The record of such vacancies shall be kept in the sequence in which they occur and in groups of multiples of ten consecutive vacancies. Whenever ten positions which may have but need not have the same classification or salary become vacant in a group, one of the ten positions in the group shall become a surplus vacant position within the prohibition first above set forth and shall not be filled. Any state officer or head of a state department or agency or division of either created by law may fill any nine of the ten vacancies in a group at any time and if it is necessary to lay off a person appointed to fill one of the ten positions in a group, the vacancy created thereby shall become the surplus vacant position in the group, but shall not then be a vacancy in any other group of vacant positions.

Subd. 2. The provisions of Subdivision 1 hereof shall not apply (1) to any state office, department or agency or division of either created by law which, on the effective date of this act, had fewer than 25 positions in the classified service established on the records of the department of civil service, (2) to any state institution or hospital, (3) to the maintenance districts of the department of highways, (4) to any positions which are classified by the department of civil service as recurrent seasonal positions (5) to vacancies in positions which occurred prior to July 1, 1959, or (6) to

vacancies in positions which occur due to termination during the probationary period.

Sec. 65. COMMISSARY AND QUARTERS ALLOWANCE. No commissary privileges, including food, laundry service, and household supplies, shall be furnished to any officer or employee living in staff residences or apartments at the State Training School for Boys and the Home School for Girls out of appropriations made by this act.

To the Superintendents of the State Training School for Boys and the Home School for Girls, the Commissioner of Corrections, if there be one, or the Chairman of the Youth Conservation Commission, is authorized to pay out of the salary appropriations for these institutions, a maintenance allowance of not to exceed \$175.00 per month.

Sec. 66. LIMITATIONS ON APPROPRIATIONS. All the foregoing appropriations herein contained are to be expended subject to the provisions of Laws 1939, Chapter 431. No appropriation shall become available for expenditure until such estimates as required by Section 16, Article II, of such act shall have been approved by the commissioner of administration. No obligation involving expenditure of money shall be entered into unless there is a balance in the appropriation available not otherwise encumbered to pay obligations previously incurred.

Sec. 67. FURNITURE PURCHASES FROM STATE REFORMATORY. Provided, insofar as practicable, all furniture to be purchased by state departments from moneys made available in this act, shall be procured from the State Reformatory for Men, notwithstanding any other provisions to the contrary.

Sec. 68. None of the moneys appropriated by this act or any other law shall be expended in making any refund where the amount thereof is \$1.00 or less.
