1.9	(1) Minnesota's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program payment error rate,
1.10	which measures how accurately the state issues benefits to program recipients, is
1.11	unacceptably high as compared with the national average payment error rate for the

1.13	(2) Minnesota has a recent history of higher than average payment error rates, as
1.14	demonstrated by a 2012 state payment error rate of 5.07 percent, compared with the
1.15	national average payment error rate of 3.42 percent; a 2011 state payment error rate of 5.02
1.16	percent, compared with the national average of 3.80 percent; and a 2010 state payment
1.17	error rate of 4.76 percent, compared with the national average of 3.81 percent; and
