1.2 relating to human services; modifying the disability waiver rate system; amending  
1.3 Minnesota Statutes 2016, section 256B.4914, subdivision 4; Minnesota Statutes  
1.4 2017 Supplement, section 256B.4914, subdivisions 2, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 10a; Laws  
1.5 2014, chapter 312, article 27, section 76.

1.6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.7 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2017 Supplement, section 256B.4914, subdivision 2, is  
1.8 amended to read:

1.9 Subd. 2. **Definitions.** (a) For purposes of this section, the following terms have the  
1.10 meanings given them, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.

1.11 (b) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of human services.

1.12 (c) "Component value" means underlying factors that are part of the cost of providing  
1.13 services that are built into the waiver rates methodology to calculate service rates.

1.14 (d) "Customized living tool" means a methodology for setting service rates that delineates  
1.15 and documents the amount of each component service included in a recipient's customized  
1.16 living service plan.

1.17 (e) "Direct care staff" means employees providing direct service provision to people  
1.18 receiving services under this section. Direct care staff does not include executive, managerial,  
1.19 and administrative staff.

1.20 (f) "Disability waiver rates system" means a statewide system that establishes rates that  
1.21 are based on uniform processes and captures the individualized nature of waiver services  
1.22 and recipient needs.

2.1 ~~(f)~~ (g) "Individual staffing" means the time spent as a one-to-one interaction specific to  
2.2 an individual recipient by staff to provide direct support and assistance with activities of  
2.3 daily living, instrumental activities of daily living, and training to participants, and is based  
2.4 on the requirements in each individual's coordinated service and support plan under section  
2.5 245D.02, subdivision 4b; any coordinated service and support plan addendum under section  
2.6 245D.02, subdivision 4c; and an assessment tool. Provider observation of an individual's  
2.7 needs must also be considered.

2.8 ~~(g)~~ (h) "Lead agency" means a county, partnership of counties, or tribal agency charged  
2.9 with administering waived services under sections 256B.092 and 256B.49.

2.10 ~~(h)~~ (i) "Median" means the amount that divides distribution into two equal groups,  
2.11 one-half above the median and one-half below the median.

2.12 ~~(i)~~ (j) "Payment or rate" means reimbursement to an eligible provider for services  
2.13 provided to a qualified individual based on an approved service authorization.

2.14 ~~(j)~~ (k) "Rates management system" means a Web-based software application that uses  
2.15 a framework and component values, as determined by the commissioner, to establish service  
2.16 rates.

2.17 ~~(k)~~ (l) "Recipient" means a person receiving home and community-based services funded  
2.18 under any of the disability waivers.

2.19 ~~(l)~~ (m) "Shared staffing" means time spent by employees, not defined under paragraph  
2.20 ~~(f)~~ (g), providing or available to provide more than one individual with direct support and  
2.21 assistance with activities of daily living as defined under section 256B.0659, subdivision  
2.22 1, paragraph (b); instrumental activities of daily living as defined under section 256B.0659,  
2.23 subdivision 1, paragraph (i); ancillary activities needed to support individual services; and  
2.24 training to participants, and is based on the requirements in each individual's coordinated  
2.25 service and support plan under section 245D.02, subdivision 4b; any coordinated service  
2.26 and support plan addendum under section 245D.02, subdivision 4c; an assessment tool; and  
2.27 provider observation of an individual's service need. Total shared staffing hours are divided  
2.28 proportionally by the number of individuals who receive the shared service provisions.

2.29 ~~(m)~~ (n) "Staffing ratio" means the number of recipients a service provider employee  
2.30 supports during a unit of service based on a uniform assessment tool, provider observation,  
2.31 case history, and the recipient's services of choice, and not based on the staffing ratios under  
2.32 section 245D.31.

2.33 ~~(n)~~ (o) "Unit of service" means the following:

3.1 (1) for residential support services under subdivision 6, a unit of service is a day. Any  
3.2 portion of any calendar day, within allowable Medicaid rules, where an individual spends  
3.3 time in a residential setting is billable as a day;

3.4 (2) for day services under subdivision 7:

3.5 (i) for day training and habilitation services, a unit of service is either:

3.6 (A) a day unit of service is defined as six or more hours of time spent providing direct  
3.7 services and transportation; or

3.8 (B) a partial day unit of service is defined as fewer than six hours of time spent providing  
3.9 direct services and transportation; and

3.10 (C) for new day service recipients after January 1, 2014, 15 minute units of service must  
3.11 be used for fewer than six hours of time spent providing direct services and transportation;

3.12 (ii) for adult day and structured day services, a unit of service is a day or 15 minutes. A  
3.13 day unit of service is six or more hours of time spent providing direct services;

3.14 (iii) for prevocational services, a unit of service is a day or an hour. A day unit of service  
3.15 is six or more hours of time spent providing direct service;

3.16 (3) for unit-based services with programming under subdivision 8:

3.17 (i) for supported living services, a unit of service is a day or 15 minutes. When a day  
3.18 rate is authorized, any portion of a calendar day where an individual receives services is  
3.19 billable as a day; and

3.20 (ii) for all other services, a unit of service is 15 minutes; and

3.21 (4) for unit-based services without programming under subdivision 9, a unit of service  
3.22 is 15 minutes.

3.23 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2016, section 256B.4914, subdivision 4, is amended to read:

3.24 Subd. 4. **Data collection for rate determination.** (a) Rates for applicable home and  
3.25 community-based waived services, including rate exceptions under subdivision 12, are  
3.26 set by the rates management system.

3.27 (b) Data for services under section 256B.4913, subdivision 4a, shall be collected in a  
3.28 manner prescribed by the commissioner.

3.29 (c) Data and information in the rates management system may be used to calculate an  
3.30 individual's rate.

4.1 (d) Service providers, with information from the community support plan and oversight  
4.2 by lead agencies, shall provide values and information needed to calculate an individual's  
4.3 rate into the rates management system. The determination of service levels must be part of  
4.4 a discussion with members of the support team as defined in section 245D.02, subdivision  
4.5 34. This discussion must occur prior to the final establishment of each individual's rate. The  
4.6 values and information include:

4.7 (1) shared staffing hours;

4.8 (2) individual staffing hours;

4.9 (3) direct registered nurse hours;

4.10 (4) direct licensed practical nurse hours;

4.11 (5) staffing ratios;

4.12 (6) information to document variable levels of service qualification for variable levels  
4.13 of reimbursement in each framework;

4.14 (7) shared or individualized arrangements for unit-based services, including the staffing  
4.15 ratio;

4.16 (8) number of trips and miles for transportation services; and

4.17 (9) service hours provided through monitoring technology.

4.18 (e) Updates to individual data must include:

4.19 (1) data for each individual that is updated annually when renewing service plans; and

4.20 (2) requests by individuals or lead agencies to update a rate whenever there is a change  
4.21 in an individual's service needs, with accompanying documentation.

4.22 (f) Lead agencies shall review and approve all services reflecting each individual's needs,  
4.23 and the values to calculate the final payment rate for services with variables under  
4.24 subdivisions 6, 7, 8, and 9 for each individual. Lead agencies must notify the individual and  
4.25 the service provider of the final agreed-upon values and rate, and provide information that  
4.26 is identical to what was entered into the rates management system. If a value used was  
4.27 mistakenly or erroneously entered and used to calculate a rate, a provider may petition lead  
4.28 agencies to correct it. Lead agencies must respond to these requests. When responding to  
4.29 the request, the lead agency must consider:

5.1 (1) meeting the health and welfare needs of the individual or individuals receiving  
5.2 services by service site, identified in their coordinated service and support plan under section  
5.3 245D.02, subdivision 4b, and any addendum under section 245D.02, subdivision 4c;

5.5 and ~~(m)~~(n); and meeting or exceeding the licensing standards for staffing required under  
5.6 section 245D.09, subdivision 1; and

5.7 (3) meeting the staffing ratio requirements under subdivision 2, paragraph (n), and  
5.8 meeting or exceeding the licensing standards for staffing required under section 245D.31.

5.11 Subd. 5. **Base wage index and standard component values.** (a) The base wage index  
5.12 is established to determine staffing costs associated with providing services to individuals  
5.13 receiving home and community-based services. For purposes of developing and calculating  
5.14 the proposed base wage, Minnesota-specific wages taken from job descriptions and standard  
5.15 occupational classification (SOC) codes from the Bureau of Labor Statistics as defined in  
5.16 the most recent edition of the Occupational Handbook must be used. The base wage index  
5.17 must be calculated as follows:

5.19 (i) 15 percent of the subtotal of 50 percent of the median wage for personal and home

5.26 31-1014); 20 percent of the median wage for psychiatric technician (SOC code 29-2053);  
5.27 and 20 percent of the median wage for social and human services aide (SOC code 21-1093);

5.28 (2) for day services, 20 percent of the median wage for nursing assistant (SOC code  
5.29 31-1014); 20 percent of the median wage for psychiatric technician (SOC code 29-2053);  
5.30 and 60 percent of the median wage for social and human services aide (SOC code 21-1093);

5.31 (3) for residential asleep-overnight staff, the wage is the minimum wage in Minnesota  
5.32 for large employers, except in a family foster care setting, the wage is 36 percent of the  
5.33 minimum wage in Minnesota for large employers;

6.1 (4) for behavior program analyst staff, 100 percent of the median wage for mental health  
6.2 counselors (SOC code 21-1014);

6.3 (5) for behavior program professional staff, 100 percent of the median wage for clinical  
6.4 counseling and school psychologist (SOC code 19-3031);

6.5 (6) for behavior program specialist staff, 100 percent of the median wage for psychiatric  
6.6 technicians (SOC code 29-2053);

6.7 (7) for supportive living services staff, 20 percent of the median wage for nursing assistant  
6.8 (SOC code 31-1014); 20 percent of the median wage for psychiatric technician (SOC code  
6.9 29-2053); and 60 percent of the median wage for social and human services aide (SOC code

6.11 (8) for housing access coordination staff, 100 percent of the median wage for community

6.18 (10) for individualized home supports services staff, 40 percent of the median wage for  
6.19 community social service specialist (SOC code 21-1099); 50 percent of the median wage  
6.20 for social and human services aide (SOC code 21-1093); and ten percent of the median  
6.21 wage for psychiatric technician (SOC code 29-2053);

6.22 (11) for independent living skills staff, 40 percent of the median wage for community  
6.23 social service specialist (SOC code 21-1099); 50 percent of the median wage for social and  
6.24 human services aide (SOC code 21-1093); and ten percent of the median wage for psychiatric  
6.25 technician (SOC code 29-2053);

6.26 (12) for independent living skills specialist staff, 100 percent of mental health and  
6.27 substance abuse social worker (SOC code 21-1023);

6.28 (13) for supported employment staff, 20 percent of the median wage for nursing assistant  
6.29 (SOC code 31-1014); 20 percent of the median wage for psychiatric technician (SOC code  
6.30 29-2053); and 60 percent of the median wage for social and human services aide (SOC code  
6.31 21-1093);

7.1 (14) for employment support services staff, 50 percent of the median wage for  
7.2 rehabilitation counselor (SOC code 21-1015); and 50 percent of the median wage for  
7.3 community and social services specialist (SOC code 21-1099);

7.4 (15) for employment exploration services staff, 50 percent of the median wage for  
7.5 rehabilitation counselor (SOC code 21-1015); and 50 percent of the median wage for  
7.6 community and social services specialist (SOC code 21-1099);

7.7 (16) for employment development services staff, 50 percent of the median wage for  
7.8 education, guidance, school, and vocational counselors (SOC code 21-1012); and 50 percent  
7.9 of the median wage for community and social services specialist (SOC code 21-1099);

7.10 (17) for adult companion staff, 50 percent of the median wage for personal and home  
7.11 care aide (SOC code 39-9021); and 50 percent of the median wage for nursing assistant

7.14 (SOC code 31-1011); 20 percent of the median wage for personal and home health aide

7.25 services specialist (SOC code 21-1099), with the exception of the supervisor of behavior  
7.26 professional, behavior analyst, and behavior specialists, which is 100 percent of the median  
7.27 wage for clinical counseling and school psychologist (SOC code 19-3031);

7.28 (22) for registered nurse staff, 100 percent of the median wage for registered nurses  
7.29 (SOC code 29-1141); and

7.30 (23) for licensed practical nurse staff, 100 percent of the median wage for licensed  
7.31 practical nurses (SOC code 29-2061).

7.32 (b) Component values for residential support services are:

- 8.1 (1) supervisory span of control ratio: 11 percent;
- 8.2 (2) employee vacation, sick, and training allowance ratio: 8.71 percent;
- 8.3 (3) employee-related cost ratio: 23.6 percent;
- 8.4 (4) general administrative support ratio: 13.25 percent;
- 8.5 (5) program-related expense ratio: 1.3 percent; and
- 8.6 (6) absence and utilization factor ratio: 3.9 percent.
- 8.7 (c) Component values for family foster care are:
- 8.8 (1) supervisory span of control ratio: 11 percent;

- 9.24 values and load them into the rate management system. On ~~July~~ January 1, 2022, and every
- 9.25 ~~five~~ two years thereafter, the commissioner shall update the base wage index in paragraph
- 9.26 (a) based on the ~~most recently available~~ wage data by SOC from the Bureau of Labor

10.4 Consumer Price Index. The commissioner will adjust these values higher or lower by the  
10.5 percentage change in the Consumer Price Index-All Items, United States city average  
10.6 (CPI-U) from January 1, 2014, to January 1, 2017. The commissioner shall publish these  
10.7 updated values and load them into the rate management system. On ~~July~~ January 1, 2022,

10.21 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective January 1, 2022, except the amendment  
10.22 to paragraph (k), which is effective July 1, 2018, or upon federal approval. The commissioner  
10.23 shall inform the revisor of statutes when federal approval is obtained.

10.30 recipient's needs provided on site or through monitoring technology;

10.32 Minnesota-specific rates or rates derived by the commissioner as provided in subdivision  
10.33 5. This is defined as the direct-care rate;

11.1 (3) for a recipient requiring customization for deaf and hard-of-hearing language  
11.2 accessibility under subdivision 12, add the customization rate provided in subdivision 12  
11.3 to the result of clause (2). This is defined as the customized direct-care rate;

11.4 (4) multiply the number of shared and individual direct staff hours provided on site or  
11.5 through monitoring technology and nursing hours by the appropriate staff wages in  
11.6 subdivision 5, paragraph (a), or the customized direct-care rate;

11.7 (5) multiply the number of shared and individual direct staff hours provided on site or  
11.8 through monitoring technology and nursing hours by the product of the supervision span  
11.9 of control ratio in subdivision 5, paragraph (b), clause (1), and the appropriate supervision  
11.10 wage in subdivision 5, paragraph (a), clause (21);

11.11 (6) combine the results of clauses (4) and (5), excluding any shared and individual direct  
11.12 staff hours provided through monitoring technology, and multiply the result by one plus  
11.13 the employee vacation, sick, and training allowance ratio in subdivision 5, paragraph (b),  
11.14 clause (2). This is defined as the direct staffing cost;

11.15 (7) for employee-related expenses, multiply the direct staffing cost, excluding any shared  
11.16 and individual direct staff hours provided through monitoring technology, by one plus the  
11.17 employee-related cost ratio in subdivision 5, paragraph (b), clause (3);

11.18 (8) for client programming and supports, the commissioner shall add \$2,179; and

11.19 (9) for transportation, if provided, the commissioner shall add \$1,680, or \$3,000 if  
11.20 customized for adapted transport, based on the resident with the highest assessed need.

11.21 (b) The total rate must be calculated using the following steps:

11.22 (1) subtotal paragraph (a), clauses (7) to (9), and the direct staffing cost of any shared  
11.23 and individual direct staff hours provided through monitoring technology that was excluded  
11.24 in clause (7);

11.25 (2) sum the standard general and administrative rate, the program-related expense ratio,  
11.26 and the absence and utilization ratio; and

11.27 (3) divide the result of clause (1) by one minus the result of clause (2). This is the total  
11.28 payment amount; and

11.29 ~~(4) adjust the result of clause (3) by a factor to be determined by the commissioner to~~  
11.30 ~~adjust for regional differences in the cost of providing services.~~

11.31 (c) The payment methodology for customized living, 24-hour customized living, and  
11.32 residential care services must be the customized living tool. Revisions to the customized

12.1 living tool must be made to reflect the services and activities unique to disability-related  
12.2 recipient needs.

12.3 (d) For individuals enrolled prior to January 1, 2014, the days of service authorized must  
12.4 meet or exceed the days of service used to convert service agreements in effect on December  
12.5 1, 2013, and must not result in a reduction in spending or service utilization due to conversion  
12.6 during the implementation period under section 256B.4913, subdivision 4a. If during the  
12.7 implementation period, an individual's historical rate, including adjustments required under  
12.8 section 256B.4913, subdivision 4a, paragraph (c), is equal to or greater than the rate  
12.9 determined in this subdivision, the number of days authorized for the individual is 365.

12.10 (e) The number of days authorized for all individuals enrolling after January 1, 2014,  
12.11 in residential services must include every day that services start and end.
