2.12 PERSONAL CARE ASSISTANCE SERVICES

2.13 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256B.0659, subdivision 30, is amended to
2.14 read:

2.15 Subd. 30. **Notice of service changes to recipients.** The commissioner must provide:

2.16 (1) by October 31, 2009, information to recipients likely to be affected that (i)
2.17 describes the changes to the personal care assistance program that may result in the
2.18 loss of access to personal care assistance services, and (ii) includes resources to obtain
2.19 further information;

2.20 (2) notice of changes in medical assistance personal care assistance services to each
2.21 affected recipient at least 30 days before the effective date of the change.

2.22 The notice shall include how to get further information on the changes, how to get help to
2.23 obtain other services, a list of community resources, and appeal rights. Notwithstanding
2.24 section 256.045, a recipient may request continued services pending appeal within ~~the~~
2.25 time period allowed to request an appeal 30 days after the notice of change in personal
2.26 care assistance services, or before the effective date of action, whichever is later. A
2.27 managed care enrollee may request continuation of services pending an appeal to the state
2.28 within ten days after the written resolution of a managed care organization appeal, or
2.29 before the effective date of action, whichever is later; and

3.1 (3) a service agreement authorizing personal care assistance hours of service at
3.2 the previously authorized level, throughout the appeal process period, when a recipient
3.3 requests services pending an appeal.

3.5 **FEDERAL POVERTY GUIDELINES**

3.6 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256B.056, subdivision 1c, is amended to
3.7 read:

3.8 Subd. 1c. **Families with children income methodology.** (a)(1) [Expired, 1Sp2003
3.9 c 14 art 12 s 17]

3.10 (2) For applications processed within one calendar month prior to July 1, 2003,
3.11 eligibility shall be determined by applying the income standards and methodologies in
3.12 effect prior to July 1, 2003, for any months in the six-month budget period before July
3.13 1, 2003, and the income standards and methodologies in effect on July 1, 2003, for any
3.14 months in the six-month budget period on or after that date. The income standards for
3.15 each month shall be added together and compared to the applicant's total countable income
3.16 for the six-month budget period to determine eligibility.

3.17 (3) For children ages one through 18 whose eligibility is determined under section
3.18 256B.057, subdivision 2, the following deductions shall be applied to income counted
3.19 toward the child's eligibility as allowed under the state's AFDC plan in effect as of July
3.20 16, 1996: \$90 work expense, dependent care, and child support paid under court order.
3.21 This clause is effective October 1, 2003.

3.22 (b) For families with children whose eligibility is determined using the standard
3.23 specified in section 256B.056, subdivision 4, paragraph (c), 17 percent of countable
3.24 earned income shall be disregarded for up to four months and the following deductions
3.25 shall be applied to each individual's income counted toward eligibility as allowed under
3.26 the state's AFDC plan in effect as of July 16, 1996: dependent care and child support paid
3.27 under court order.

3.28 (c) If the four-month disregard in paragraph (b) has been applied to the wage
3.29 earner's income for four months, the disregard shall not be applied again until the wage
3.30 earner's income has not been considered in determining medical assistance eligibility for
3.31 12 consecutive months.

3.32 (d) The commissioner shall adjust the income standards under this section each July 1
3.33 by the annual update of the federal poverty guidelines following publication by the United
3.34 States Department of Health and Human Services except that the income standards shall
3.35 not go below ~~those~~ the income standards in effect on July 1, 2009 of the preceding year.

4.1 (e) For children age 18 or under, annual gifts of \$2,000 or less by a tax-exempt
4.2 organization to or for the benefit of the child with a life-threatening illness must be
4.3 disregarded from income.

4.4 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256L.04, subdivision 7b, is amended to read:

4.5 Subd. 7b. **Annual income limits adjustment.** The commissioner shall adjust the
4.6 income limits under this section each July 1 by the annual update of the federal poverty
4.7 guidelines following publication by the United States Department of Health and Human
4.8 Services except that the income standards shall not go below ~~those~~ the income standards
4.9 in effect on the preceding July 1, ~~2009~~.

4.10 ARTICLE 4

4.11 CLARIFICATION OF AMERICAN INDIAN LANGUAGE IN ARRA

4.12 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256B.056, subdivision 3, is amended to
4.13 read:

4.14 Subd. 3. **Asset limitations for individuals and families.** (a) To be eligible for
4.15 medical assistance, a person must not individually own more than \$3,000 in assets, or if a
4.16 member of a household with two family members, husband and wife, or parent and child,
4.17 the household must not own more than \$6,000 in assets, plus \$200 for each additional
4.18 legal dependent. In addition to these maximum amounts, an eligible individual or family
4.19 may accrue interest on these amounts, but they must be reduced to the maximum at the
4.20 time of an eligibility redetermination. The accumulation of the clothing and personal
4.21 needs allowance according to section 256B.35 must also be reduced to the maximum at
4.22 the time of the eligibility redetermination. The value of assets that are not considered in
4.23 determining eligibility for medical assistance is the value of those assets excluded under
4.24 the supplemental security income program for aged, blind, and disabled persons, with
4.25 the following exceptions:

4.26 (1) household goods and personal effects are not considered;

4.27 (2) capital and operating assets of a trade or business that the local agency determines
4.28 are necessary to the person's ability to earn an income are not considered;

4.29 (3) motor vehicles are excluded to the same extent excluded by the supplemental
4.30 security income program;

4.31 (4) assets designated as burial expenses are excluded to the same extent excluded by
4.32 the supplemental security income program. Burial expenses funded by annuity contracts
4.33 or life insurance policies must irrevocably designate the individual's estate as contingent
4.34 beneficiary to the extent proceeds are not used for payment of selected burial expenses; ~~and~~

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5.1 (5) effective upon federal approval, for a person who no longer qualifies as an
5.2 employed person with a disability due to loss of earnings, assets allowed while eligible
5.3 for medical assistance under section 256B.057, subdivision 9, are not considered for 12
5.4 months, beginning with the first month of ineligibility as an employed person with a
5.5 disability, to the extent that the person's total assets remain within the allowed limits of
5.6 section 256B.057, subdivision 9, paragraph (c); and

5.7 (6) effective July 1, 2009, certain assets owned by American Indians are excluded,
5.8 as required by section 5006 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009,
5.9 Public Law 111-5. For purposes of this clause, an American Indian is a person who meets
5.10 the definition of Indian according to Code of Federal Regulations, title 42, section 447.50.

5.11 (b) No asset limit shall apply to persons eligible under section 256B.055, subdivision
5.12 15.

5.13 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256B.056, subdivision 3c, is amended to read:

5.14 Subd. 3c. **Asset limitations for families and children.** A household of two or more
5.15 persons must not own more than \$20,000 in total net assets, and a household of one
5.16 person must not own more than \$10,000 in total net assets. In addition to these maximum
5.17 amounts, an eligible individual or family may accrue interest on these amounts, but they
5.18 must be reduced to the maximum at the time of an eligibility redetermination. The value of
5.19 assets that are not considered in determining eligibility for medical assistance for families
5.20 and children is the value of those assets excluded under the AFDC state plan as of July 16,
5.21 1996, as required by the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation
5.22 Act of 1996 (PRWORA), Public Law 104-193, with the following exceptions:

5.23 (1) household goods and personal effects are not considered;

5.24 (2) capital and operating assets of a trade or business up to \$200,000 are not
5.25 considered, except that a bank account that contains personal income or assets, or is used to
5.26 pay personal expenses, is not considered a capital or operating asset of a trade or business;

5.27 (3) one motor vehicle is excluded for each person of legal driving age who is
5.28 employed or seeking employment;

5.29 (4) assets designated as burial expenses are excluded to the same extent they are
5.30 excluded by the Supplemental Security Income program;

5.31 (5) court-ordered settlements up to \$10,000 are not considered;

5.32 (6) individual retirement accounts and funds are not considered; ~~and~~

5.33 (7) assets owned by children are not considered; and

5.34 (8) effective July 1, 2009, certain assets owned by American Indians are excluded,
5.35 as required by section 5006 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009,

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6.1 Public Law 111-5. For purposes of this clause, an American Indian is a person who meets
6.2 the definition of Indian according to Code of Federal Regulations, title 42, section 447.50.

6.3 The assets specified in clause (2) must be disclosed to the local agency at the time of
6.4 application and at the time of an eligibility redetermination, and must be verified upon
6.5 request of the local agency.

6.6 Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256B.057, subdivision 9, is amended to read:

6.7 Subd. 9. **Employed persons with disabilities.** (a) Medical assistance may be paid
6.8 for a person who is employed and who:

6.9 (1) but for excess earnings or assets, meets the definition of disabled under the
6.10 Supplemental Security Income program;

6.11 (2) is at least 16 but less than 65 years of age;

6.12 (3) meets the asset limits in paragraph (c); and

6.13 (4) pays a premium and other obligations under paragraph (e).

6.14 Any spousal income or assets shall be disregarded for purposes of eligibility and premium
6.15 determinations.

6.16 (b) After the month of enrollment, a person enrolled in medical assistance under
6.17 this subdivision who:

6.18 (1) is temporarily unable to work and without receipt of earned income due to a
6.19 medical condition, as verified by a physician, may retain eligibility for up to four calendar
6.20 months; or

6.21 (2) effective January 1, 2004, loses employment for reasons not attributable to the
6.22 enrollee, may retain eligibility for up to four consecutive months after the month of job
6.23 loss. To receive a four-month extension, enrollees must verify the medical condition or
6.24 provide notification of job loss. All other eligibility requirements must be met and the
6.25 enrollee must pay all calculated premium costs for continued eligibility.

6.26 (c) For purposes of determining eligibility under this subdivision, a person's assets
6.27 must not exceed \$20,000, excluding:

6.28 (1) all assets excluded under section 256B.056;

6.29 (2) retirement accounts, including individual accounts, 401(k) plans, 403(b) plans,
6.30 Keogh plans, and pension plans; and

6.31 (3) medical expense accounts set up through the person's employer.

6.32 (d)(1) Effective January 1, 2004, for purposes of eligibility, there will be a \$65
6.33 earned income disregard. To be eligible, a person applying for medical assistance under
6.34 this subdivision must have earned income above the disregard level.

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7.1 (2) Effective January 1, 2004, to be considered earned income, Medicare, Social
7.2 Security, and applicable state and federal income taxes must be withheld. To be eligible,
7.3 a person must document earned income tax withholding.

7.4 (e)(1) (i) Except as provided in item (ii), a person whose earned and unearned
7.5 income is equal to or greater than 100 percent of federal poverty guidelines for the
7.6 applicable family size must pay a premium to be eligible for medical assistance under this
7.7 subdivision. The premium shall be based on the person's gross earned and unearned
7.8 income and the applicable family size using a sliding fee scale established by the
7.9 commissioner, which begins at one percent of income at 100 percent of the federal poverty
7.10 guidelines and increases to 7.5 percent of income for those with incomes at or above 300
7.11 percent of the federal poverty guidelines. Annual adjustments in the premium schedule
7.12 based upon changes in the federal poverty guidelines shall be effective for premiums
7.13 due in July of each year.

7.14 (ii) Effective July 1, 2009, American Indians are exempt from paying premiums as
7.15 required by section 5006 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, Public
7.16 Law 111-5. For purposes of this paragraph, an American Indian is a person who meets the
7.17 definition of Indian according to Code of Federal Regulations, title 42, section 447.50.

7.18 (2) Effective January 1, 2004, all enrollees must pay a premium to be eligible for
7.19 medical assistance under this subdivision. An enrollee shall pay the greater of a \$35
7.20 premium or the premium calculated in clause (1).

7.21 (3) Effective November 1, 2003, all enrollees who receive unearned income must
7.22 pay one-half of one percent of unearned income in addition to the premium amount.

7.23 (4) Effective November 1, 2003, for enrollees whose income does not exceed 200
7.24 percent of the federal poverty guidelines and who are also enrolled in Medicare, the
7.25 commissioner must reimburse the enrollee for Medicare Part B premiums under section
7.26 256B.0625, subdivision 15, paragraph (a).

7.27 (5) Increases in benefits under title II of the Social Security Act shall not be counted
7.28 as income for purposes of this subdivision until July 1 of each year.

7.29 (f) A person's eligibility and premium shall be determined by the local county
7.30 agency. Premiums must be paid to the commissioner. All premiums are dedicated to
7.31 the commissioner.

7.32 (g) Any required premium shall be determined at application and redetermined at
7.33 the enrollee's six-month income review or when a change in income or household size is
7.34 reported. Enrollees must report any change in income or household size within ten days
7.35 of when the change occurs. A decreased premium resulting from a reported change in
7.36 income or household size shall be effective the first day of the next available billing month

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8.1 after the change is reported. Except for changes occurring from annual cost-of-living
8.2 increases, a change resulting in an increased premium shall not affect the premium amount
8.3 until the next six-month review.

8.4 (h) Premium payment is due upon notification from the commissioner of the
8.5 premium amount required. Premiums may be paid in installments at the discretion of
8.6 the commissioner.

8.7 (i) Nonpayment of the premium shall result in denial or termination of medical
8.8 assistance unless the person demonstrates good cause for nonpayment. Good cause exists
8.9 if the requirements specified in Minnesota Rules, part 9506.0040, subpart 7, items B to
8.10 D, are met. Except when an installment agreement is accepted by the commissioner,
8.11 all persons disenrolled for nonpayment of a premium must pay any past due premiums
8.12 as well as current premiums due prior to being reenrolled. Nonpayment shall include
8.13 payment with a returned, refused, or dishonored instrument. The commissioner may
8.14 require a guaranteed form of payment as the only means to replace a returned, refused,
8.15 or dishonored instrument.

8.16 (j) The commissioner shall notify enrollees annually beginning at least 24 months
8.17 before the person's 65th birthday of the medical assistance eligibility rules affecting
8.18 income, assets, and treatment of a spouse's income and assets that will be applied upon
8.19 reaching age 65.

8.20 Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256L.05, subdivision 3, is amended to read:

8.21 Subd. 3. **Effective date of coverage.** (a) The effective date of coverage is the
8.22 first day of the month following the month in which eligibility is approved and either
8.23 the first premium payment or documentation of American Indian status according to
8.24 section 256L.15, subdivision 1, paragraph (d), has been received. As provided in section
8.25 256B.057, coverage for newborns is automatic from the date of birth and must be
8.26 coordinated with other health coverage. The effective date of coverage for eligible newly
8.27 adoptive children added to a family receiving covered health services is the month of
8.28 placement. The effective date of coverage for other new members added to the family
8.29 is the first day of the month following the month in which the change is reported. All
8.30 eligibility criteria must be met by the family at the time the new family member is added.
8.31 The income of the new family member is included with the family's gross income and the
8.32 adjusted premium begins in the month the new family member is added.

8.33 (b) The initial premium must be received by the last working day of the month for
8.34 coverage to begin the first day of the following month.

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9.1 (c) Benefits are not available until the day following discharge if an enrollee is
9.2 hospitalized on the first day of coverage.

9.3 (d) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, benefits under sections 256L.01 to
9.4 256L.18 are secondary to a plan of insurance or benefit program under which an eligible
9.5 person may have coverage and the commissioner shall use cost avoidance techniques to
9.6 ensure coordination of any other health coverage for eligible persons. The commissioner
9.7 shall identify eligible persons who may have coverage or benefits under other plans of
9.8 insurance or who become eligible for medical assistance.

9.9 Sec. 5. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256L.15, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

9.10 Subdivision 1. **Premium determination.** (a) Families with children and individuals
9.11 shall pay a premium determined according to subdivision 2.

9.12 (b) Pregnant women and children under age two are exempt from the provisions
9.13 of section 256L.06, subdivision 3, paragraph (b), clause (3), requiring disenrollment
9.14 for failure to pay premiums. For pregnant women, this exemption continues until the
9.15 first day of the month following the 60th day postpartum. Women who remain enrolled
9.16 during pregnancy or the postpartum period, despite nonpayment of premiums, shall be
9.17 disenrolled on the first of the month following the 60th day postpartum for the penalty
9.18 period that otherwise applies under section 256L.06, unless they begin paying premiums.

9.19 (c) Members of the military and their families who meet the eligibility criteria
9.20 for MinnesotaCare upon eligibility approval made within 24 months following the end
9.21 of the member's tour of active duty shall have their premiums paid by the commissioner.
9.22 The effective date of coverage for an individual or family who meets the criteria of this
9.23 paragraph shall be the first day of the month following the month in which eligibility is
9.24 approved. This exemption applies for 12 months. This paragraph expires June 30, 2010.
9.25 If the expiration of this provision is in violation of section 5001 of Public Law 111-5, this
9.26 provision will expire on the date when it is no longer subject to section 5001 of Public Law
9.27 111-5. The commissioner of human services shall notify the revisor of statutes of that date.

9.28 (d) Beginning July 1, 2009, American Indians enrolled in MinnesotaCare and their
9.29 families must have their premiums waived by the commissioner in accordance with
9.30 section 5006 of Public Law 111-5. An individual must document status as an American
9.31 Indian, as defined under Code of Federal Regulations, title 42, section 447.50, to qualify
9.32 for the exception from premium requirements.

9.33 Sec. 6. **REPEALER.**

9.34 Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256.01, subdivision 18b, is repealed.

ARTICLE 5

ACTIVE PHARMACEUTICAL INGREDIENTS

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256B.0625, subdivision 13, is amended to read:

Subd. 13. **Drugs.** (a) Medical assistance covers drugs, except for fertility drugs when specifically used to enhance fertility, if prescribed by a licensed practitioner and dispensed by a licensed pharmacist, by a physician enrolled in the medical assistance program as a dispensing physician, or by a physician, physician assistant, or a nurse practitioner employed by or under contract with a community health board as defined in section 145A.02, subdivision 5, for the purposes of communicable disease control.

(b) The dispensed quantity of a prescription drug must not exceed a 34-day supply, unless authorized by the commissioner.

(c) For the purpose of this subdivision, an "active pharmaceutical ingredient" is defined as a substance that is represented for use in a drug and that, when used in the manufacturing, processing, or packaging of a drug, becomes an active ingredient of the drug product. An excipient is defined as an inert substance used as a diluent or vehicle for a drug. The commissioner shall establish a list of active pharmaceutical ingredients and excipients which are included in the medical assistance formulary. Medical assistance covers selected active pharmaceutical ingredients and excipients used in compounded prescriptions when the compounded combination is specifically approved by the commissioner or when:

(1) a commercially available product is not a therapeutic option for the patient;

(2) a commercially available product does not exist in the same combination of active ingredients in the same strengths as the compounded prescription; and

(3) a commercially available product cannot be used in place of the active pharmaceutical ingredient in the compounded prescription.

~~(c)~~ (d) Medical assistance covers the following over-the-counter drugs when prescribed by a licensed practitioner or by a licensed pharmacist who meets standards established by the commissioner, in consultation with the board of pharmacy: antacids, acetaminophen, family planning products, aspirin, insulin, products for the treatment of lice, vitamins for adults with documented vitamin deficiencies, vitamins for children under the age of seven and pregnant or nursing women, and any other over-the-counter drug identified by the commissioner, in consultation with the formulary committee, as necessary, appropriate, and cost-effective for the treatment of certain specified chronic diseases, conditions, or disorders, and this determination shall not be subject to the

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11.1 requirements of chapter 14. A pharmacist may prescribe over-the-counter medications as
11.2 provided under this paragraph for purposes of receiving reimbursement under Medicaid.
11.3 When prescribing over-the-counter drugs under this paragraph, licensed pharmacists must
11.4 consult with the recipient to determine necessity, provide drug counseling, review drug
11.5 therapy for potential adverse interactions, and make referrals as needed to other health
11.6 care professionals.

11.7 ~~(d)~~ (e) Effective January 1, 2006, medical assistance shall not cover drugs that
11.8 are coverable under Medicare Part D as defined in the Medicare Prescription Drug,
11.9 Improvement, and Modernization Act of 2003, Public Law 108-173, section 1860D-2(e),
11.10 for individuals eligible for drug coverage as defined in the Medicare Prescription
11.11 Drug, Improvement, and Modernization Act of 2003, Public Law 108-173, section
11.12 1860D-1(a)(3)(A). For these individuals, medical assistance may cover drugs from the
11.13 drug classes listed in United States Code, title 42, section 1396r-8(d)(2), subject to this
11.14 subdivision and subdivisions 13a to 13g, except that drugs listed in United States Code,
11.15 title 42, section 1396r-8(d)(2)(E), shall not be covered.

11.16 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256B.0625, subdivision 13d, is amended to
11.17 read:

11.18 Subd. 13d. **Drug formulary.** (a) The commissioner shall establish a drug
11.19 formulary. Its establishment and publication shall not be subject to the requirements of the
11.20 Administrative Procedure Act, but the Formulary Committee shall review and comment

Separate payment outside of the facility's payment rate shall be made for wheelchairs and wheelchair accessories for recipients who are residents of intermediate care facilities for the developmentally disabled. Reimbursement for wheelchairs and wheelchair accessories for ICF/MR recipients shall be subject to the same conditions and limitations as coverage for recipients who do not reside in institutions. A wheelchair purchased outside of the facility's payment rate is the property of the recipient. The commissioner may set reimbursement rates for specified categories of medical supplies at levels below the Medicare payment rate.

(b) Vendors of durable medical equipment, prosthetics, orthotics, or medical supplies must enroll as a Medicare provider.

(c) When necessary to ensure access to durable medical equipment, prosthetics, orthotics, or medical supplies, the commissioner may exempt a vendor from the Medicare enrollment requirement if:

(1) the vendor supplies only one type of durable medical equipment, prosthetic, orthotic, or medical supply;

(2) the vendor serves ten or fewer medical assistance recipients per year;

(3) the commissioner finds that other vendors are not available to provide same or similar durable medical equipment, prosthetics, orthotics, or medical supplies; and

(4) the vendor complies with all screening requirements in this chapter and Code of Federal Regulations, title 42, part 455.

(d) Durable medical equipment means a device or equipment that:

(1) can withstand repeated use;

(2) is provided to correct or accommodate a physiological disorder or physical condition;

(3) is suitable for use in the recipient's residence;

(4) is used primarily for a medical purpose; and

(5) is generally not useful in the absence of an illness or injury.

ARTICLE 11

ELIMINATE ELDERLY WAIVER PAYMENT

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Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2010, section 256B.69, subdivision 5, is amended to read:

Subd. 5. **Prospective per capita payment.** The commissioner shall establish the method and amount of payments for services. The commissioner shall annually contract with demonstration providers to provide services consistent with these established methods and amounts for payment.

If allowed by the commissioner, a demonstration provider may contract with an insurer, health care provider, nonprofit health service plan corporation, or the commissioner, to provide insurance or similar protection against the cost of care provided by the demonstration provider or to provide coverage against the risks incurred by demonstration providers under this section. The recipients enrolled with a demonstration provider are a permissible group under group insurance laws and chapter 62C, the Nonprofit Health Service Plan Corporations Act. Under this type of contract, the insurer or corporation may make benefit payments to a demonstration provider for services rendered or to be rendered to a recipient. Any insurer or nonprofit health service plan corporation licensed to do business in this state is authorized to provide this insurance or similar protection.

Payments to providers participating in the project are exempt from the requirements of sections 256.966 and 256B.03, subdivision 2. The commissioner shall complete development of capitation rates for payments before delivery of services under this section is begun. For payments made during calendar year 1990 and later years, the commissioner shall contract with an independent actuary to establish prepayment rates.

By January 15, 1996, the commissioner shall report to the legislature on the methodology used to allocate to participating counties available administrative reimbursement for advocacy and enrollment costs. The report shall reflect the commissioner's judgment as to the adequacy of the funds made available and of the methodology for equitable distribution of the funds. The commissioner must involve participating counties in the development of the report.

SPECIAL NEEDS BASIC CARE MEDICAID SERVICES

Subd. 28. **Medicare special needs plans; medical assistance basic health care.** (a)

The commissioner may contract with demonstration providers and sponsors of qualified Medicare-approved special needs plans, to provide medical assistance basic health care services to persons with disabilities, including those with developmental disabilities.

Basic health care services include:

(1) those services covered by the medical assistance state plan except for ICF/MR services, home and community-based waiver services, case management for persons with developmental disabilities under section 256B.0625, subdivision 20a, and personal care and certain home care services defined by the commissioner in consultation with the stakeholder group established under paragraph (d); and

(2) basic health care services may also include risk for up to 100 days of nursing facility services for persons who reside in a noninstitutional setting and home health services related to rehabilitation as defined by the commissioner after consultation with the stakeholder group.

The commissioner may exclude other medical assistance services from the basic health care benefit set. Enrollees in these plans can access any excluded services on the same basis as other medical assistance recipients who have not enrolled.

Unless a person is otherwise required to enroll in managed care, enrollment in these plans for Medicaid services must be voluntary. For purposes of this subdivision, automatic enrollment with an option to opt out is not voluntary enrollment.

(b) Beginning January 1, 2007, the commissioner may contract with demonstration providers and sponsors of qualified Medicare special needs plans, to provide basic health care services under medical assistance to persons who are dually eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid and those Social Security beneficiaries eligible for Medicaid but in the waiting period for Medicare. The commissioner shall consult with the stakeholder group under paragraph (d) in developing program specifications for these services.

The commissioner shall report to the chairs of the house of representatives and senate committees with jurisdiction over health and human services policy and finance by February 1, 2007, on implementation of these programs and the need for increased funding for the ombudsman for managed care and other consumer assistance and protections needed due to enrollment in managed care of persons with disabilities. Payment for

20.1 Medicaid services provided under this subdivision for the months of May and June will
20.2 be made no earlier than July 1 of the same calendar year.
