1.15 Subd. 15a. Law enforcement authority. "Law enforcement authority" means a

1.16 government agency or department within or outside Minnesota with jurisdiction to investigate

1.17 or bring a civil or criminal action against a child care provider, including a county, city, or

1.18 district attorney's office, the Attorney General's Office, a human services agency, a United

1.19 States attorney's office, or a law enforcement agency.

2.2 Subd. 5. **Program integrity.** For child care assistance programs under this chapter, the
2.3 commissioner shall enforce the requirements for program integrity and fraud prevention
2.4 investigations under sections 256.046, 256.98, and 256.983 and chapter 245E.

3.12 Sec. 5. **[119B.097] AUTHORIZATION WITH A SECONDARY PROVIDER.**

3.13 (a) If a child uses any combination of the following providers paid by child care
 3.14 assistance, a parent must choose one primary provider and one secondary provider per child
 3.15 that can be paid by child care assistance:

3.16 (1) an individual or child care center licensed under chapter 245A;

3.17 (2) an individual or child care center or facility holding a valid child care license issued
 3.18 by another state or tribe; or

3.19 (3) a child care center exempt from licensing under section 245A.03.

3.20 (b) The amount of child care authorized with the secondary provider cannot exceed 20
 3.21 hours per two-week service period, per child, and the amount of care paid to a child's
 3.22 secondary provider is limited under section 119B.13, subdivision 1. The total amount of
 3.23 child care authorized with both the primary and secondary provider cannot exceed the
 3.24 amount of child care allowed based on the parents' eligible activity schedule, the child's
 3.25 school schedule, and any other factors relevant to the family's child care needs.

 3.30 reason to believe that the provider is unsafe or that the circumstances of the chosen child
 3.31 care arrangement are unsafe. The county must include the conditions under which a provider

4.2 under section 119B.08, subdivision 3.

4.8 and must make those records available immediately to the county or the commissioner upon
4.9 request. The attendance records must be completed daily and include the date, the first and
4.10 last name of each child in attendance, and the times when each child is dropped off and
4.11 picked up. To the extent possible, the times that the child was dropped off to and picked up
4.12 from the child care provider must be entered by the person dropping off or picking up the
4.13 child. The daily attendance records must be retained at the site where services are delivered
4.14 for six years after the date of service.

4.15 (b) A county or the commissioner may deny or revoke a provider's authorization as a
4.16 child care provider to any applicant, rescind authorization of any provider, to receive child
4.17 care assistance payments under section 119B.13, subdivision 6, paragraph (d), pursue a
4.18 fraud disqualification under section 256.98, take an action against the provider under chapter
4.19 245E, or establish an attendance record overpayment claim in the system under paragraph
4.20 (c) against a current or former provider, when the county or the commissioner knows or
4.21 has reason to believe that the provider has not complied with the record-keeping requirement
4.22 in this subdivision. A provider's failure to produce attendance records as requested on more
4.23 than one occasion constitutes grounds for disqualification as a provider.

4.24 (c) To calculate an attendance record overpayment under this subdivision, the
4.25 commissioner or county agency subtracts the maximum daily rate from the total amount
4.26 paid to a provider for each day that a child's attendance record is missing, unavailable,
4.27 incomplete, illegible, inaccurate, or otherwise inadequate.

4.28 (d) The commissioner shall develop criteria to direct a county when the county must
4.29 establish an attendance overpayment under this subdivision.

5.2 Subdivision 1. **Subsidy restrictions.** (a) Beginning February 3, 2014, the maximum
5.3 rate paid for child care assistance in any county or county price cluster under the child care
5.4 fund shall be the greater of the 25th percentile of the 2011 child care provider rate survey
5.5 or the maximum rate effective November 28, 2011. The commissioner may: (1) assign a
5.6 county with no reported provider prices to a similar price cluster; and (2) consider county
5.7 level access when determining final price clusters.

5.8 (b) A rate which includes a special needs rate paid under subdivision 3 may be in excess
5.9 of the maximum rate allowed under this subdivision.

5.10 (c) The department shall monitor the effect of this paragraph on provider rates. The

6.2 Subd. 6. **Provider payments.** (a) A provider must bill only for services documented
6.3 according to section 119B.125, subdivision 6. The provider shall bill for services provided
6.4 within ten days of the end of the service period. ~~If bills are submitted within ten days of the~~
6.5 ~~end of the service period,~~ Payments under the child care fund shall be made within ~~30~~ 21
6.6 days of receiving a complete bill from the provider. Counties or the state may establish
6.7 policies that make payments on a more frequent basis.

6.8 (b) If a provider has received an authorization of care and been issued a billing form for
6.9 an eligible family, the bill must be submitted within 60 days of the last date of service on
6.10 the bill. A bill submitted more than 60 days after the last date of service must be paid if the
6.11 county determines that the provider has shown good cause why the bill was not submitted
6.12 within 60 days. Good cause must be defined in the county's child care fund plan under
6.13 section 119B.08, subdivision 3, and the definition of good cause must include county error.
6.14 Any bill submitted more than a year after the last date of service on the bill must not be
6.15 paid.

6.16 (c) If a provider provided care for a time period without receiving an authorization of
6.17 care and a billing form for an eligible family, payment of child care assistance may only be
6.18 made retroactively for a maximum of six months from the date the provider is issued an
6.19 authorization of care and billing form.

6.20 (d) A county or the commissioner may refuse to issue a child care authorization to a
6.21 licensed or legal nonlicensed provider, revoke an existing child care authorization to a
6.22 licensed or legal nonlicensed provider, stop payment issued to a licensed or legal nonlicensed
6.23 provider, or refuse to pay a bill submitted by a licensed or legal nonlicensed provider if:

6.24 (1) the provider admits to intentionally giving the county materially false information
6.25 on the provider's billing forms;

6.26 (2) a county or the commissioner finds by a preponderance of the evidence that the
6.27 provider intentionally gave the county materially false information on the provider's billing

7.5 (6) the provider gives false child care price information; or

7.6 (7) the provider fails to grant access to a county or the commissioner during regular
 7.7 business hours to examine all records necessary to determine the extent of services provided
 7.8 to a child care assistance recipient and the appropriateness of a claim for payment.

7.9 (e) If a county or the commissioner finds that a provider violated paragraph (d), clause
 7.10 (1) or (2), a county or the commissioner must deny or revoke the provider's authorization
 7.11 and either pursue a fraud disqualification under section 256.98, subdivision 8, paragraph
 7.12 (c) or refer the case to a law enforcement authority. A provider's rights related to an
 7.13 authorization denial or revocation under this paragraph are established in section 119B.161.
 7.14 If a provider's authorization is revoked or denied under this paragraph, the denial or
 7.15 revocation lasts until either:

7.16 (1) all criminal, civil, and administrative proceedings related to the provider's alleged
 7.17 misconduct conclude and any appeal rights are exhausted; or

7.18 (2) the commissioner decides, based on written evidence or argument submitted under
 7.19 section 119B.161, to authorize the provider.

7.20 (f) If a county or the commissioner denies or revokes a provider's authorization under
 7.21 paragraph (d), clause (4), the provider shall not be authorized until the order of suspension
 7.22 or order of revocation against the provider is lifted.

 8.12 may request and receive a fair hearing in accordance with this subdivision and section
 8.13 256.045.

8.14 (b) A county agency must offer an informal conference to an applicant or recipient who
 8.15 is entitled to a fair hearing under this section. A county agency shall advise an adversely
 8.16 affected applicant or recipient that a request for a conference is optional and does not delay
 8.17 or replace the right to a fair hearing.

8.18 (c) An applicant or recipient does not have a right to a fair hearing if a county agency

 8.30 ~~overpayment. The scope of the fair hearing does not include the issues of whether the~~
 8.31 ~~provider wrongfully obtained public assistance in violation of section 256.98 or was properly~~

9.8 to a consolidated contested case hearing under section 119B.16, subdivision 3, or an
9.9 administrative review under section 119B.161;

9.10 (2) assigns responsibility for an overpayment to a provider under section 119B.11,
9.11 subdivision 2a;

9.12 (3) establishes an overpayment for failure to comply with section 119B.125, subdivision
9.13 6;

9.14 (4) seeks monetary recovery or recoupment under section 245E.02, subdivision 4,
9.15 paragraph (c), clause (2);

9.16 (5) initiates an administrative fraud disqualification hearing; or

9.22 (1) each disputed item, the reason for the dispute, and, if appropriate, an estimate of the
9.23 dollar amount involved for each disputed item;

9.26 (4) the name, address, and telephone number of the person at the provider's place of
9.27 business with whom contact may be made regarding the appeal.

11.22 if the commissioner reviewed all allegations, facts, and evidence carefully and acts judiciously
11.23 on a case-by-case basis.

11.24 Subd. 2. **Notice.** (a) A county or the commissioner must mail a provider notice within
11.25 five days of suspending, revoking, or denying a provider's authorization under subdivision
11.26 1.

11.27 (b) The notice must:

11.28 (1) state the provision under which a county or the commissioner is denying, revoking,
11.29 or suspending a provider's authorization or suspending payment to the provider;

12.1 (2) set forth the general allegations leading to the revocation, denial, or suspension of a
 12.2 provider's authorization. The notice need not disclose any specific information concerning
 12.3 an ongoing investigation;

12.4 (3) state that the suspension, revocation, or denial of a provider's authorization is for a

3400.0185 TERMINATION AND ADVERSE ACTIONS; NOTICE REQUIRED.

Subp. 5. **Notice to providers of actions adverse to the provider.** The county must give a provider written notice of the following actions adverse to the provider: a denial of authorization, a termination of authorization, a reduction in the number of hours of care with that provider, and a determination that the provider has an overpayment. The notice must include the following information:

- A. a description of the adverse action;
- B. the effective date of the adverse action; and

C. a statement that unless a family appeals the adverse action before the effective date or the provider appeals the overpayment determination, the adverse action will occur on the effective date. The notice must be mailed to the provider at least 15 calendar days before the effective date of the adverse action.
