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1.1 A bill for an act

1.2 relating to education; requiring school districts to pay the cost of a college entrance

1.3 exam for all students in grade 11 or 12; appropriating money to reimburse districts

1.4 for college entrance exam costs; amending Minnesota Statutes 2018, section

1.5 120B.30, subdivision 1.

1.6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.7 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 120B.30, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

1.8 Subdivision 1. **Statewide testing.** (a) The commissioner, with advice from experts with

1.9 appropriate technical qualifications and experience and stakeholders, consistent with

1.10 subdivision 1a, shall include in the comprehensive assessment system, for each grade level

1.11 to be tested, state-constructed tests developed as computer-adaptive reading and mathematics

1.12 assessments for students that are aligned with the state's required academic standards under

1.13 section 120B.021, include multiple choice questions, and are administered annually to all

1.14 students in grades 3 through 8. State-developed high school tests aligned with the state's

1.15 required academic standards under section 120B.021 and administered to all high school

1.16 students in a subject other than writing must include multiple choice questions. The

1.17 commissioner shall establish one or more months during which schools shall administer

1.18 the tests to students each school year.

1.19 (1) Students enrolled in grade 8 through the 2009-2010 school year are eligible to be

1.20 assessed under (i) the graduation-required assessment for diploma in reading, mathematics,

1.21 or writing under Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 120B.30, subdivision 1, paragraphs (c),

1.22 clauses (1) and (2), and (d), (ii) the WorkKeys job skills assessment, (iii) the Compass

1.23 college placement test, (iv) the ACT assessment for college admission, (v) a nationally

1.24 recognized armed services vocational aptitude test.

2.1 (2) Students enrolled in grade 8 in the 2010-2011 or 2011-2012 school year are eligible
2.2 to be assessed under (i) the graduation-required assessment for diploma in reading,
2.3 mathematics, or writing under Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 120B.30, subdivision 1,
2.4 paragraph (c), clauses (1) and (2), (ii) the WorkKeys job skills assessment, (iii) the Compass
2.5 college placement test, (iv) the ACT assessment for college admission, (v) a nationally
2.6 recognized armed services vocational aptitude test.

2.7 (3) For students under clause (1) or (2), a school district may substitute a score from an
2.8 alternative, equivalent assessment to satisfy the requirements of this paragraph.

2.9 (b) The state assessment system must be aligned to the most recent revision of academic
2.10 standards as described in section 120B.023 in the following manner:

2.11 (1) mathematics;

2.12 (i) grades 3 through 8 beginning in the 2010-2011 school year; and

2.13 (ii) high school level beginning in the 2013-2014 school year;

2.14 (2) science; grades 5 and 8 and at the high school level beginning in the 2011-2012
2.15 school year; and

2.16 (3) language arts and reading; grades 3 through 8 and high school level beginning in the
2.17 2012-2013 school year.

2.18 (c) For students enrolled in grade 8 in the 2012-2013 school year and later, students'
2.19 state graduation requirements, based on a longitudinal, systematic approach to student
2.20 education and career planning, assessment, instructional support, and evaluation, include
2.21 the following:

2.22 (1) achievement and career and college readiness in mathematics, reading, and writing,
2.23 consistent with paragraph (k) and to the extent available, to monitor students' continuous
2.24 development of and growth in requisite knowledge and skills; analyze students' progress
2.25 and performance levels, identifying students' academic strengths and diagnosing areas where
2.26 students require curriculum or instructional adjustments, targeted interventions, or
2.27 remediation; and, based on analysis of students' progress and performance data, determine
2.28 students' learning and instructional needs and the instructional tools and best practices that
2.29 support academic rigor for the student; and

2.30 (2) consistent with this paragraph and section 120B.125, age-appropriate exploration
2.31 and planning activities and career assessments to encourage students to identify personally
2.32 relevant career interests and aptitudes and help students and their families develop a regularly

3.1 reexamined transition plan for postsecondary education or employment without need for
3.2 postsecondary remediation.

3.3 Based on appropriate state guidelines, students with an individualized education program
3.4 may satisfy state graduation requirements by achieving an individual score on the
3.5 state-identified alternative assessments.

3.6 (d) Expectations of schools, districts, and the state for career or college readiness under
3.7 this subdivision must be comparable in rigor, clarity of purpose, and rates of student
3.8 completion.

3.9 A student under paragraph (c), clause (1), must receive targeted, relevant, academically
3.10 rigorous, and resourced instruction, which may include a targeted instruction and intervention
3.11 plan focused on improving the student's knowledge and skills in core subjects so that the
3.12 student has a reasonable chance to succeed in a career or college without need for
3.13 postsecondary remediation. Consistent with sections 120B.13, 124D.09, 124D.091, 124D.49,
3.14 and related sections, an enrolling school or district must actively encourage a student in
3.15 grade 11 or 12 who is identified as academically ready for a career or college to participate
3.16 in courses and programs awarding college credit to high school students. Students are not
3.17 required to achieve a specified score or level of proficiency on an assessment under this
3.18 subdivision to graduate from high school.

3.19 (e) Though not a high school graduation requirement, students are encouraged to
3.20 participate in a nationally recognized college entrance exam. To the extent state funding
3.21 for college entrance exam fees is available, a district must pay the cost, one time, for an
3.22 interested student in grade 11 or 12 ~~who is eligible for a free or reduced-price meal~~, to take
3.23 a nationally recognized college entrance exam before graduating. A student must be able
3.24 to take the exam under this paragraph at the student's high school during the school day and
3.25 at any one of the multiple exam administrations available to students in the district. A district
3.26 may administer the ACT or SAT or both the ACT and SAT to comply with this paragraph.
3.27 If the district administers only one of these two tests and a ~~free or reduced-price meal eligible~~
3.28 student opts not to take that test and chooses instead to take the other of the two tests, the
3.29 student may take the other test at a different time or location and remains eligible for the
3.30 examination fee reimbursement. ~~Notwithstanding sections 123B.34 to 123B.39, a school~~
3.31 ~~district may require a student that is not eligible for a free or reduced-price meal to pay the~~
3.32 ~~cost of taking a nationally recognized college entrance exam. The district must waive the~~
3.33 ~~cost for a student unable to pay.~~

4.1 (f) The commissioner and the chancellor of the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities
4.2 must collaborate in aligning instruction and assessments for adult basic education students
4.3 and English learners to provide the students with diagnostic information about any targeted
4.4 interventions, accommodations, modifications, and supports they need so that assessments
4.5 and other performance measures are accessible to them and they may seek postsecondary
4.6 education or employment without need for postsecondary remediation. When administering
4.7 formative or summative assessments used to measure the academic progress, including the
4.8 oral academic development, of English learners and inform their instruction, schools must
4.9 ensure that the assessments are accessible to the students and students have the modifications
4.10 and supports they need to sufficiently understand the assessments.

4.11 (g) Districts and schools, on an annual basis, must use career exploration elements to
4.12 help students, beginning no later than grade 9, and their families explore and plan for
4.13 postsecondary education or careers based on the students' interests, aptitudes, and aspirations.
4.14 Districts and schools must use timely regional labor market information and partnerships,
4.15 among other resources, to help students and their families successfully develop, pursue,
4.16 review, and revise an individualized plan for postsecondary education or a career. This
4.17 process must help increase students' engagement in and connection to school, improve
4.18 students' knowledge and skills, and deepen students' understanding of career pathways as
4.19 a sequence of academic and career courses that lead to an industry-recognized credential,
4.20 an associate's degree, or a bachelor's degree and are available to all students, whatever their
4.21 interests and career goals.

4.22 (h) A student who demonstrates attainment of required state academic standards, which
4.23 include career and college readiness benchmarks, on high school assessments under
4.24 subdivision 1a is academically ready for a career or college and is encouraged to participate
4.25 in courses awarding college credit to high school students. Such courses and programs may
4.26 include sequential courses of study within broad career areas and technical skill assessments
4.27 that extend beyond course grades.

4.28 (i) As appropriate, students through grade 12 must continue to participate in targeted
4.29 instruction, intervention, or remediation and be encouraged to participate in courses awarding
4.30 college credit to high school students.

4.31 (j) In developing, supporting, and improving students' academic readiness for a career
4.32 or college, schools, districts, and the state must have a continuum of empirically derived,
4.33 clearly defined benchmarks focused on students' attainment of knowledge and skills so that
4.34 students, their parents, and teachers know how well students must perform to have a
4.35 reasonable chance to succeed in a career or college without need for postsecondary

5.1 remediation. The commissioner, in consultation with local school officials and educators,
5.2 and Minnesota's public postsecondary institutions must ensure that the foundational
5.3 knowledge and skills for students' successful performance in postsecondary employment
5.4 or education and an articulated series of possible targeted interventions are clearly identified
5.5 and satisfy Minnesota's postsecondary admissions requirements.

5.6 (k) For students in grade 8 in the 2012-2013 school year and later, a school, district, or
5.7 charter school must record on the high school transcript a student's progress toward career
5.8 and college readiness, and for other students as soon as practicable.

5.9 (l) The school board granting students their diplomas may formally decide to include a
5.10 notation of high achievement on the high school diplomas of those graduating seniors who,
5.11 according to established school board criteria, demonstrate exemplary academic achievement
5.12 during high school.

5.13 (m) The 3rd through 8th grade computer-adaptive assessment results and high school
5.14 test results shall be available to districts for diagnostic purposes affecting student learning
5.15 and district instruction and curriculum, and for establishing educational accountability. The
5.16 commissioner must establish empirically derived benchmarks on adaptive assessments in
5.17 grades 3 through 8. The commissioner, in consultation with the chancellor of the Minnesota
5.18 State Colleges and Universities, must establish empirically derived benchmarks on the high
5.19 school tests that reveal a trajectory toward career and college readiness consistent with
5.20 section 136F.302, subdivision 1a. The commissioner must disseminate to the public the
5.21 computer-adaptive assessments and high school test results upon receiving those results.

5.22 (n) The grades 3 through 8 computer-adaptive assessments and high school tests must
5.23 be aligned with state academic standards. The commissioner shall determine the testing
5.24 process and the order of administration. The statewide results shall be aggregated at the site
5.25 and district level, consistent with subdivision 1a.

5.26 (o) The commissioner shall include the following components in the statewide public
5.27 reporting system:

5.28 (1) uniform statewide computer-adaptive assessments of all students in grades 3 through
5.29 8 and testing at the high school levels that provides appropriate, technically sound
5.30 accommodations or alternate assessments;

5.31 (2) educational indicators that can be aggregated and compared across school districts
5.32 and across time on a statewide basis, including average daily attendance, high school
5.33 graduation rates, and high school drop-out rates by age and grade level;

6.1 (3) state results on the American College Test; and

6.2 (4) state results from participation in the National Assessment of Educational Progress
6.3 so that the state can benchmark its performance against the nation and other states, and,
6.4 where possible, against other countries, and contribute to the national effort to monitor
6.5 achievement.

6.6 (p) For purposes of statewide accountability, "career and college ready" means a high
6.7 school graduate has the knowledge, skills, and competencies to successfully pursue a career
6.8 pathway, including postsecondary credit leading to a degree, diploma, certificate, or
6.9 industry-recognized credential and employment. Students who are career and college ready
6.10 are able to successfully complete credit-bearing coursework at a two- or four-year college
6.11 or university or other credit-bearing postsecondary program without need for remediation.

6.12 (q) For purposes of statewide accountability, "cultural competence," "cultural
6.13 competency," or "culturally competent" means the ability of families and educators to
6.14 interact effectively with people of different cultures, native languages, and socioeconomic
6.15 backgrounds.

6.16 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective for the 2019-2020 school year and later.

6.17 **Sec. 2. ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION; COLLEGE ENTRANCE**
6.18 **EXAMINATION REIMBURSEMENT.**
