1.1 A bill for an act
1.2 relating to natural resources; appropriating money from outdoor heritage fund.

1.3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.4 Section 1. APPROPRIATIONS.

1.5 The sums shown in the columns marked "Appropriations" are appropriated to the agencies
1.6 and for the purposes specified in this act. The appropriations are from the outdoor heritage
1.7 fund for the fiscal year indicated for each purpose. The figures "2022" and "2023" used in
1.8 this act mean that the appropriations listed under the figure are available for the fiscal year
1.9 ending June 30, 2022, and June 30, 2023, respectively. The "first year" is fiscal year 2022.
1.10 The "second year" is fiscal year 2023. The "biennium" is fiscal years 2022 and 2023. The
1.11 appropriations in this act are onetime appropriations.

2.10 to acquire land in fee for scientific and natural  
2.11 area purposes under Minnesota Statutes,  
2.12 section 86A.05, subdivision 5. Subject to  
2.13 evaluation criteria in Minnesota Rules, part  
2.14 6136.0900, priority must be given to acquiring  
2.15 lands that are eligible for the native prairie  
2.16 bank under Minnesota Statutes, section 84.96,  
2.17 or lands adjacent to protected native prairie.  
2.18 A list of proposed land acquisitions must be  
2.19 provided as part of the required

3.27 \$3,280,000 the first year is to the  
3.28 commissioner of natural resources for an

3.31 Wildlife Service, to acquire land in fee or  
3.32 permanent conservation easements and restore  
3.33 and enhance lands in the Northern Tallgrass  
3.34 Prairie Habitat Preservation Area in western  
3.35 Minnesota for addition to the Northern  
3.36 Tallgrass Prairie National Wildlife Refuge.

4.1 Subject to evaluation criteria in Minnesota  
4.2 Rules, part 6136.0900, priority must be given  
4.3 to acquiring lands that are eligible for the  
4.4 native prairie bank under Minnesota Statutes,

4.19 acquire land in fee in the Cannon River  
4.20 watershed for wildlife management under  
4.21 Minnesota Statutes, section 86A.05,  
4.22 subdivision 8; to acquire land in fee for aquatic  
4.23 management purposes under Minnesota  
4.24 Statutes, section 86A.05, subdivision 14; to  
4.25 acquire land in fee for scientific and natural

5.16 enforcement funds as approved in the  
5.17 accomplishment plan and subject to Minnesota  
5.18 Statutes, section 97A.056, subdivision 17.  
5.19 Subject to evaluation criteria in Minnesota  
5.20 Rules, part 6136.0900, priority must be given  
5.21 to acquiring lands that are eligible for the  
5.22 native prairie bank under Minnesota Statutes,  
5.23 section 84.96, or lands adjacent to protected  
5.24 native prairie. A list of permanent conservation  
5.25 easements must be provided as part of the final  
5.26 report.

5.29 \$4,170,000 the first year is to the Board of  
5.30 Water and Soil Resources to acquire  
5.31 permanent conservation easements and restore  
5.32 habitat under Minnesota Statutes, section  
5.33 103F.515, to protect, restore, and enhance  
5.34 habitat, including by expanding the riparian  
5.35 buffer and floodplain program under the clean  
5.36 water fund for wildlife benefits from buffers

6.1 on private land. Of this amount, up to  
6.2 \$195,000 is for establishing a monitoring and  
6.3 enforcement fund as approved in the  
6.4 accomplishment plan and subject to Minnesota  
6.5 Statutes, section 97A.056, subdivision 17. A  
6.6 list of permanent conservation easements must  
6.7 be provided as part of the final report.

6.8 **(h) Prairie Chicken Habitat Partnership of**  
6.9 **Southern Red River Valley, Phase VII**

6.10 \$2,264,000 the first year is to the  
6.11 commissioner of natural resources for an  
6.12 agreement with Pheasants Forever, in  
6.13 cooperation with the Minnesota Prairie  
6.14 Chicken Society, to acquire land in fee and to  
6.15 restore and enhance lands in the southern Red  
6.16 River Valley for wildlife management under  
6.17 Minnesota Statutes, section 86A.05,  
6.18 subdivision 8, or to be designated and  
6.19 managed as waterfowl production areas in  
6.20 Minnesota in cooperation with the United  
6.21 States Fish and Wildlife Service. Subject to  
6.22 evaluation criteria in Minnesota Rules, part  
6.23 6136.0900, priority must be given to acquiring  
6.24 lands that are eligible for the native prairie

7.2 easements and to restore wetlands and prairie  
7.3 grasslands. Of this amount, \$3,153,000 is to  
7.4 Ducks Unlimited and \$1,599,000 is to  
7.5 Pheasants Forever. A list of proposed  
7.6 acquisitions and restorations must be provided  
7.7 as part of the required accomplishment plan.

7.20 the Conservation Fund. A list of proposed  
7.21 acquisitions must be provided as part of the

10.26 plan must include an easement monitoring and  
10.27 enforcement plan. Of this amount, up to

10.29 enforcement fund as approved in the
