

*Deadline extensions may be possible at the editor's discretion; however, none will be made beyond the second Wednesday (12 calendar days) preceding the issue date for rules, proposed rules and executive orders, or beyond the Wednesday (5 calendar days) preceding the issue date for official notices. Requests for deadline extensions should be made only in valid emergency situations.

**Notices of public hearings on proposed rules and notices of intent to adopt rules without a public hearing are published in the Proposed Rules section and must be submitted two weeks prior to the issue date.

The *State Register* is published every Monday (Tuesday when Monday is a holiday) by the State of Minnesota, Department of Administration, Print Communications Division, 117 University Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota 55155, pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes* § 14.46. A *State Register Contracts Supplement* is published every Thursday. The Monday edition is the vehicle for conveying all information about state agency rulemaking, including official notices; hearing notices; proposed, adopted and emergency rules. It also contains executive orders of the governor; commissioners' orders; state contracts and advertised bids; professional, technical and consulting contracts; non-state public contracts; state grants; decisions of the supreme court; a monthly calendar of scheduled cases before the supreme court; and other announcements. The Thursday edition contains additional state contracts and advertised bids, and the most complete listing of contract awards available in one source.

In accordance with expressed legislative intent that the *State Register* be self-supporting, the following subscription rates have been established: the Monday edition costs \$140.00 per year and includes an index issue published in August (single issues are available at the address listed above for \$3.50 per copy); the combined Monday and Thursday editions cost \$195.00 (subscriptions are not available for just the *Contracts Supplement*); trial subscriptions are available for \$60.00, include both the Monday and Thursday edition, last for 13 weeks, and may be converted to a full subscription anytime by making up the price difference. No refunds will be made in the event of subscription cancellation.

Both editions are delivered postpaid to points in the United States, second class postage paid for the Monday edition at St. Paul, MN, first class for the Thursday edition. Publication Number 326630 (ISSN 0146-7751).

Minnesota Rules: Amendments and Additions

NOTICE: How to Follow State Agency Rulemaking in the *State Register*

The *State Register* is the official source, and only complete listing, for all state agency rulemaking in its various stages. State agencies are required to publish notice of their rulemaking action in the *State Register*. Published every Monday, the *State Register* makes it easy to follow and participate in the important rulemaking process. Approximately 75 state agencies have the authority to issue rules. Each agency is assigned specific *Minnesota Rule* chapter numbers. Every odd-numbered year the *Minnesota Rules* are published. This is a ten-volume bound collection of all adopted rules in effect at the time. Supplements are published to update this set of rules. Proposed and adopted emergency rules do not appear in this set because of their short-term nature, but are published in the *State Register*.

If an agency seeks outside opinion before issuing new rules or rule amendments, it must publish a NOTICE OF INTENT TO SOLICIT OUTSIDE OPINION in the *Official Notices* section of the *State Register*. When rules are first drafted, state agencies publish them as **Proposed Rules**, along with a notice of hearing, or notice of intent to adopt rules without a hearing in the case of noncontroversial rules. This notice asks for comment on the rules as proposed. Proposed emergency rules and withdrawn proposed rules are also published in the *State Register*. After proposed rules have gone through the comment period, and have been rewritten into their final form, they again appear in the *State Register* as **Adopted Rules**. These final adopted rules are not printed in their entirety in the *State Register*, only the changes made since their publication as Proposed Rules. To see the full rule, as adopted and in effect, a person simply needs two issues of the *State Register*, the issue the rule appeared in as proposed, and later as adopted. For a more detailed description of the rulemaking process, see the *Minnesota Guidebook to State Agency Services*.

The *State Register* features partial and cumulative listings of rules in this section on the following schedule: issues 1-13 inclusive; issues 14-25 inclusive; issue 26, cumulative for issues 1-26; issues 27-38 inclusive; issue 39, cumulative for 1-39; issues 40-51 inclusive; and issue 52, cumulative for 1-52. An annual subject matter index for rules appears in August. Proposed Rules

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §§ 14.22, an agency may propose to adopt, amend, suspend or repeal rules without first holding a public hearing, as long as the agency determines that the rules will be noncontroversial in nature. The agency must first publish a notice of intent to adopt rules without a public hearing, together with the proposed rules, in the *State Register*. The notice must advise the public:

1. that they have 30 days in which to submit comment on the proposed rules;
2. that no public hearing will be held unless 25 or more persons make a written request for a hearing within the 30-day comment period;
3. of the manner in which persons shall request a hearing on the proposed rules; and
4. that the rule may be modified if the modifications are supported by the data and views submitted.

If, during the 30-day comment period, 25 or more persons submit to the agency a written request for a hearing of the proposed rules, the agency must proceed under the provisions of §§ 14.14-14.20, which state that if an agency decides to hold a public hearing, it must publish a notice of intent in the *State Register*.

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. §§ 14.29 and 14.30, agencies may propose emergency rules under certain circumstances. Proposed emergency rules are published in the *State Register* and, for at least 25 days thereafter, interested persons may submit data and views in writing to the proposing agency.

Proposed Rules Governing Authorization to Issue Medical Malpractice Insurance

Notice of Hearing

NOTICE IS GIVEN that a public hearing will be held pursuant to *Minnesota Statute* Section 14.14, subdivision 1 (1984), in the above-entitled matter in the First Floor Hearing Room at the Department of Commerce, 133 E. Seventh Street, St. Paul, MN 55101 on March 26, 1992 at 9:00 a.m. and continuing until all interested persons and groups have had an opportunity to be heard concerning adoption of these proposed rules by submitting either oral or written data, statements, or arguments. Statements, briefs or written material may be submitted within the comment period described in this notice without appearing at the hearing by sending them to Administrative Law Judge, Peter C. Erickson, Flour Exchange Building, Fifth Floor, 310 S. 4th Avenue, Minneapolis, MN 55415, (612) 341-7606. The rule hearing procedure is governed by *Minnesota Statute* Section 14.14-14.20 and by *Minnesota Rules* Parts 1400.0200-1400.1200, as amended (Amended Rules published at 9.SR2276). Questions regarding procedure may be directed to the Administrative Law Judge at the above-listed address.

The Commissioner is seeking to determine if there is medical malpractice insurance available in the voluntary market for either physicians, hospitals or other types of health care providers. Availability of coverage for hospitals, nursing homes and perfusionists as well as any other groups or persons unable to obtain this type of coverage will be dealt with at the hearing. If it is determined that such insurance is not available, the Commissioner will issue a rule authorizing the Joint Underwriting Association, established by *Minnesota Statutes* Chapter 62F, to issue medical malpractice insurance on a primary basis to hospitals, nursing homes, perfusionists and such others as are unable to obtain the coverage.

The Department has elected to consider the authorization to issue medical malpractice insurance by the Joint Underwriting Association to be a rule and is accordingly proceeding pursuant to Chapter 14 of *Minnesota Statutes* in regard to the rule. The General Statute Authority to adopt the proposed rules is in *MN Statute* Chapter 62F, *MN Statute* 45.023, and *MN Statute* 45.024.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT A STATEMENT OF NEED AND REASONABLENESS is now available for review at the Department of Commerce and is available at the Office of Administrative Hearings. This Statement of Need and Reasonableness includes a summary of all of the evidence and arguments which the Department anticipates presenting at the hearing justifying both the need for and the reasonableness of the proposed rules. Copies of the Statement of Need and Reasonableness may be reviewed at the Department of Commerce or the Office of Administrative Hearings and copies may be obtained from the Office of Administrative Hearings at the cost of reproduction.

Pursuant to *Minnesota Statute* Section 14.155, subdivision 2, the impact on small business has been considered in the promulgation of the rules. Anyone wishing to present evidence or argument as to the rules' effect on small business may do so. The Department's position regarding the impact of the rules on small business is set forth in greater detail in the Statement of Need and Reasonableness.

All interested or affected persons will have an opportunity to participate by presenting oral and/or written evidence at the hearing. Questioning of agency representatives or witnesses, and of interested persons making oral statements will be allowed in order to explain the purpose or intended operation of the proposed rules, or a suggesting modification, or for other purposes material to the evaluation or formulation of the proposed rules. As a result of the hearing process, the proposed rule may be modified.

Written material may be submitted to the Administrative Law Judge and recorded in the hearing record for five working days after the public hearing ends. The comment period may be extended for a longer period not to exceed 20 calendar days if ordered by the Administrative Law Judge at the hearing. Comments received during the comment period will be available for review at the Office of Administrative Hearings. Following the five to twenty day comment period, there will be a three day period in which the Commissioner

and interested persons may respond in writing to any new information submitted. During the three day period, the agency may indicate in writing whether there are any amendments suggested by other persons which the agency is willing to adopt. Additional evidence may not be submitted during the three day period. The written responses will be added to the record of the proceeding.

NOTICE: Any person may request notification of the date on which the Administrative Law Judge's report will be available after which date the Department of Commerce may not take any final action on the rules for a period of five working days. If you desire to be so notified, you may so indicate at the hearing. After the hearing, you may request notification by sending a written request to the Administrative Law Judge. Any person may request notification of the date on which the rules were adopted and filed with the Secretary of State. The notice must be mailed on the same day that the rules are filed. This includes an amount for fringe benefits and was updated to the 1992-93 school year by assuming a five percent yearly increase in teacher salaries and fringe benefit costs. By assuming another five percent increase, the agency estimates that the cost for the 1993-94 school year to be 30.1 million dollars. Costs for each of the 1993-94 and 1994-95 school years could be different, commensurate with negotiated increases for the biennium.

Also, a survey conducted by the agency supports this projection, although the estimate from this survey is somewhat higher at 34.4 million dollars per year. The agency does not believe that this rule will impact small businesses or agricultural lands. A copy of the proposed rules is attached hereto. 7521.0200 DETERMINATION OF CLAIMS.

Subpart 1. **Filing claim.** A claim for public safety officer death benefits under *Minnesota Statutes*, section 299A.44 must be on a form provided by the commissioner of public safety and must contain information relevant to the claimant's eligibility for benefits.

Certified copies of reports, certificates, and affidavits relevant to the claimant's eligibility for benefits must be filed with the claim form in order for the claim to be considered a complete claim.

A claim is considered to be filed upon receipt by the commissioner of a complete claim with the claim form signed by the claimant or the claimant's representative.

Subp. 2. **Investigation by commissioner.** When a complete claim is filed, the commissioner shall determine whether the claimant is eligible for benefits. The commissioner shall make the inquiries or investigation necessary to make the determination. The commissioner shall base the determination on the information provided on the complete claim and by the investigation of the claim.

Subp. 3. **Determination of eligibility.** On determining that the claimant is eligible for benefits, the commissioner shall initiate the payment procedure and inform the claimant. On determining that the claimant is not eligible for benefits, or that there is insufficient information on which to make a determination, the commissioner shall deny the claim and inform the claimant of the grounds for denial.

Subp. 4. **Request for reconsideration.** The claimant, within 30 days after receiving a notice of denial from the commissioner, may submit additional information to the commissioner and request a reconsideration of the claim. Upon receipt of the additional information, the commissioner shall reevaluate the claim in light of the new information and shall perform additional inquiries or investigation as necessary. The commissioner shall affirm, modify, or reverse the previous determination and shall notify the claimant of the determination and its basis.

Subp. 5. **Starting a contested case hearing.** A claimant may request a contested case hearing under *Minnesota Statutes*, chapter 14.

A claimant who has not requested reconsideration under subpart 4 shall submit a written request for a contested case hearing to the commissioner no more than 30 days after the claimant receives the notice of denial.

Subp. ~~3~~-~~4~~. **Permit modification.** "Permit modification" means a change in permit conditions that requires public comment and is subject to the procedures in parts 7001.0100 to 7001.0130. A request for a minor modification as defined in part 7001.0190, subpart 3, does not require a modification fee.

Subp. ~~4~~-~~5~~. **Permit reissuance.** "Permit reissuance" means the process by which an existing solid waste management facility permit is extended for an additional period in accordance with parts 7001.0040 to 7001.0140.

Subp. ~~5~~-~~6~~. **Permittee.** "Permittee" means the person or persons to whom the agency has issued a solid waste management facility permit.

7002.0430 PERMIT FEES SCHEDULE.

A person subject to parts 7002.0410 to 7002.0490 shall pay application, reissuance or modification, and annual fees based on the schedule in this part. These fees apply to all solid waste management facilities in operation during any part of the fiscal year. Persons shall pay the single set of fees that corresponds to their most costly solid waste management facility permit.

7002.0470 ANNUAL FEE.

A permittee whose facility accepts solid waste after the effective date of this part shall pay an annual fee as specified in part 7002.0430. The first fee payment shall be made within 60 days after the effective date of this part. In succeeding fiscal years, annual fees must be paid by ~~August~~ January 15. A permittee who has received a new solid waste management facility permit shall pay the appropriate annual fee within 30 days ~~of~~ after receiving the permit. Failure to submit the appropriate annual fee will result in the imposition of a late charge specified under part 7002.0480.

7002.0480 LATE CHARGE.

The permittee shall pay a late charge of 20 percent of the payment due for failure to submit the appropriate reissuance fee or annual fee within 30 days ~~of~~ after the required date. The permittee shall pay an additional ten percent of the balance owed for each 30-day period or portion of this period that the fee and late charge remain unpaid. The commissioner may begin a proceeding under part 7001.0190 to revoke the permit if the reissuance fee or annual fee is not paid by the required date.

7002.0490 NOTIFICATION OF ERROR.

A person who believes that a fee assessment or late charge is in error shall provide written evidence of the alleged error to the commissioner with the assessed fee and late charge. Overpayments shall be refunded if the commissioner finds, upon reviewing the data, that the assessed fee and late charge are in error. If, upon reviewing the data, the commissioner finds that the fee or late charge was properly assessed, the commissioner shall promptly notify the person in writing. Notice of Permanent List of Priorities Among Releases or Threatened Releases of Hazardous Substances or Pollutants or Contaminants

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) and the Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA), are publishing for public comment a proposed update of the Permanent List of Priorities (PLP) among releases or threatened releases of hazardous substances, pollutants, or contaminants for which the MPCA or the MDA may take removal or remedial actions under the Minnesota Environmental Response and Liability Act (MERLA), *Minnesota Statutes* ch. 115B. The statutory basis for, and explanation of, the PLP is discussed below.

Pursuant to MERLA, *Minnesota Statute* § 115B.17 (1990), the MPCA is authorized to take any removal or remedial action which the MPCA deems necessary to protect the public health, welfare, or the environment whenever there is a release, or substantial threat of release, from a facility of any pollutant or contaminant which presents an imminent and substantial danger to the public health, welfare, or the environment, or whenever a hazardous substance is released or there is a threatened release of a hazardous substance from a facility.

Where the hazardous substance or pollutant or contaminant is an agricultural chemical, as defined in *Minnesota Statute* § 18D.01, subd. 3, the Commissioner of Agriculture is authorized under MERLA to take any removal or remedial action deemed necessary with regard to such releases or threatened releases, *Minnesota Statutes* §§ 115B.17, 115B.20, subd. 1b and 18D.1051 (1990).

Minnesota Statute § 115B.17, subd. 13 (1984), required the MPCA to establish priority rules among releases or threatened releases of hazardous substances, and pollutants or contaminants. The priority rules, *Minnesota Rules* ch. 7044, became effective on July 10, 1984.

Minnesota Statute § 115B.17, subd. 13 also requires the MPCA to adopt a PLP and to update the list annually according to the criteria set forth in the priority rules. Before any update of the PLP is adopted by the MPCA, it must be published in the *State Register* and a 30-day public comment period must be provided. This notice is, therefore, published to inform the public that the MPCA is proposing to update the December 1991 PLP and to solicit public comments only on the proposed modifications.

The proposed modifications to the December 1991 PLP are hereinafter referred to as the "proposed May 1992 Update of the PLP." The proposed May 1992 Update of the PLP was developed according to the process set forth in *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7044.0400 (1991). The proposed update includes sites which have been recommended by and will be under the administrative authority of the Commissioner of Agriculture. Each site listed has been ranked using the modified Hazard Ranking System (HRS) method as required by *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7044.1000 (1991). The modified HRS is based on the original HRS (HRS I) adopted by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as published in the *Federal Register* on July 16, 1982. EPA has since revised the HRS scoring system, as published in the *Federal Register* on December 14, 1990. Any new site which is proposed for the Federal National Priorities List (NPL) is required to be scored using the revised HRS (HRS II). The MPCA and the MDA will continue to utilize the original HRS (HRS I) for ranking sites, as required by *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7044.1000, until such time as state rules are updated to reflect the revised HRS (HRS II). Each site has also passed the prescreening test of *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7044.1200 (1991) for eligibility.

The numerical scores generated by the HRS scoring process should not be interpreted as exact number priorities. The scores shown indicate the relative ranking and general classification of sites, but sites with scores within approximately 10 points of each other may be considered roughly equivalent in terms of a known or possible public health or environmental threat. Generally, the cleanup of a hazardous waste site involves a three-phase program:

1. Remedial Investigation/Feasibility Study—investigation of the extent, magnitude, and nature of the release or threatened release, and identification, evaluation, and selection of appropriate removal or remedial action(s);
2. Remedial Design—detailed design of the selected removal or remedial action(s); and
3. Response Action—implementation of the selected removal or remedial action(s).

All sites listed on the proposed May 1992 Update of the PLP have been assigned to one or more response action classes as required by *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7044.0300 (1991). (The terms response action, removal action, and remedial action are defined in *Minnesota Statute* § 115B.02.) The proposed May 1992 Update of the PLP is presented by response action class. All sites within each class are presented in order of their HRS score. Each of the four response action classes is defined as follows:

CLASS A—Declared Emergencies. This class includes all sites at which an emergency has been declared by the MPCA Commissioner or Commissioner of Agriculture pursuant to MERLA. According to *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7044.0200, subp. 4 (1991), an "emergency" means that "there is an imminent risk of fire or explosion, that a temporary water supply is needed where an advisory has been issued, or that immediate adverse human health effects may be anticipated due to direct contact or inhalation and an advisory has been issued." An "advisory" is defined in *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7044.0200, subp. 3, to mean a warning by the MPCA Commissioner, Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Health, Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, or the MDA issued to the public concerning a hazardous substance, or pollutant or contaminant at or near a site.

CLASS B—Response Actions Completed and Operation and Maintenance/Long-term Monitoring Ongoing. This class includes all sites where response actions have been completed and long-term monitoring of these completed response actions is in progress. This class also includes all sites where activities are necessary to operate and maintain response actions that have previously been completed. Examples include continued operation of a ground water pumpout system, long-term monitoring, and work necessary to maintain the integrity of the site such as maintaining cover or closure.

CLASS C—Response Actions Necessary or in Progress or First Year Operation and Maintenance at a Site. This class includes all sites where remedial design and implementation of response actions (other than Class A or B), such as barrel removal, soil decontamination, first year ground water pump out or monitoring, are necessary to effect a permanent remedy or cleanup of a site.

CLASS D—Remedial Investigations and Feasibility Studies (RI/FS) Necessary or in Progress. This class includes all sites which require a remedial investigation to determine the extent, magnitude, and nature of the release or threatened release, and a feasibility study to evaluate and select response action(s).

Funding sources for removal or remedial actions at a site include federal Superfund (CERCLA), state Superfund (MERLA), and funding by responsible parties. These sources of funding are noted in each of the class listings. In cases where site activities are funded by responsible parties, Requests for Response Action, Consent Orders, and Stipulation Agreements are noted.

Proposed changes to the December 1991 PLP, which are reflected in the proposed May 1992 Update of the PLP, include site additions. The MPCA is not proposing to delete any sites from the PLP at this time.

The MPCA proposes the following eight sites be added to the December 1991, PLP (HRS scores are in parentheses): Union Scrap II and III, Minneapolis (12); West River Parkway, Minneapolis (10); Mibco, Minnetonka (42); St. Paul Levee Property, St. Paul (20); General Fabrication, Forest Lake (34); Fridley Commons Park Well Field, Fridley (42); Winona Municipal Well Field, Winona (42); and 8701 Concord Boulevard Dump, Inver Grove Heights (28).

In addition, the MPCA proposes to add one agricultural chemical site to the December 1991 PLP, as recommended by the Commissioner of Agriculture: Perham Municipal Airfield, Perham (23). The MDA will be the administering state agency for this site along with six current PLP sites: Lund's Farmer Seed and Nursery, St. Cloud; Central Co-Operative Oil Association, Medford; Lewiston Ground Water Contamination Site, Lewiston; Castle Rock Ground Water Contamination Site, Castle Rock; Cedar Services, Minneapolis; and Howe Chemical Soil Contamination, Martin County.

The December 1991 PLP listed 179 sites. As a result of the nine proposed site additions, the proposed May 1992 Update of the PLP lists a total of 188 sites.

The PLP is required to be updated annually as specified by *Minnesota Rules* pt. 7044.0600 (1991) according to the criteria set forth in *Minnesota Rules* ch. 7044. Notice of any future updates of the PLP will be published in the *State Register* for the purpose of soliciting public comments.

Based on the above considerations, the proposed May 1992 Update of the PLP is offered for public comment. Only the changes proposed at this time are open for public comment. An eligible applicant proposing to operate an existing neighborhood land trust must currently exist as a nonprofit corporation organized under chapter 317A, qualifies for tax exempt status under the *United States Code*, title 26, section 501 (c)(3), and meets the requirements of being an eligible neighborhood land trust as specified in *Minnesota Statute*, section 462A.31.




