of willful and corrupt false swearing or affirming in taking any oath prescribed by this chapter, he shall be deemed to have committed willful and corrupt perjury, and upon conviction thereof, shall suffer the punishment attached by the laws of this state to the crime of perjury.

SEC. 72. All fines incurred under this chapter shall be paid into the county treasury of the county where the offense was committed, for the use of the common schools of such county. Fines go to county for use of schools.

SEC. 73. The provisions of this chapter apply to all elections hereafter to be held for all or any state, district, county, town, city, or township officers; and for electors of president and vice-president of the United States, and to any vote hereafter to be taken on amendments to the constitution, laws changing county lines, removing county seats, or on any subject which may by law be submitted to a vote of the people: *provided*, that the registration of the names of the electors previously to the time of voting at the town meeting of any organized township shall not be required; but the said town meeting and the manner of conducting the same shall be as provided in the general act for the organization of towns. Provisions of this chapter to apply to all elections.

SECTION 1. The state is divided into two congressional districts, each of which is entitled to elect one representative to the congress of the United States. State divided into two districts.

SEC. 2. The counties of Houston, Winona, Fillmore, Olmsted, Mower, Dodge, Freeborn, Steele, Waseca, Rice, Scott, Le Sueur, Faribault, Blue Earth, Nicollet, Sibley, Martin, Watonwan, Brown, Renville, Jackson, Cottonwood, Noble, Murray, Pipestone, Redwood and Rock, constitute the first congressional district, and are entitled to elect one representative. What counties compose first district.

SEC. 3. All the residue of the state compose the second district, and are entitled to elect one representative. Second district, what composes.
