

CHAPTER 348

BOUNTIES AND REWARDS

348.01 FOR TIMBER GROWING.

A municipality is deemed a person and may take advantage of the provisions of section 348.01 et seq. as respects its property within the municipal limits devoted and maintained for public purpose. OAG May 22, 1942 (83-E).

348.06 HORSE STEALING; REWARD FOR CONVICTION.

Under section 3.24 standing legislative appropriations are abolished. Under section 6.03 warrants are drawn by the state auditor on the state treasurer only in pursuance of an appropriation by the legislature. A claim transmitted to the state auditor by the clerk of the district court of Fillmore County for a horse stealing bounty under the provisions of section 348.06 cannot be honored by the state auditor. OAG May 1, 1947 (9-A).

348.071 BOUNTY FOR WOLF OR FOX.

A wolf running at large may be killed and the bounty claimed by any person who has not harbored it; but a person who has tamed a wolf cannot collect a bounty for killing a tame wolf. OAG April 4, 1944 (47-F).

Foxes may be hunted and killed from airplanes. OAG Oct. 2, 1944 (210-A).

While the legislature has authorized counties in certain cases to pay bounties and has provided for reimbursement by the state, there is no statutory authority by which towns may pay bounties and obtain reimbursement. OAG April 8, 1947 (47-F).

348.073 BOUNTY FOR BEAR.

A county need not establish a bounty to be paid for killing bears. OAG June 5, 1945 (47-F).
